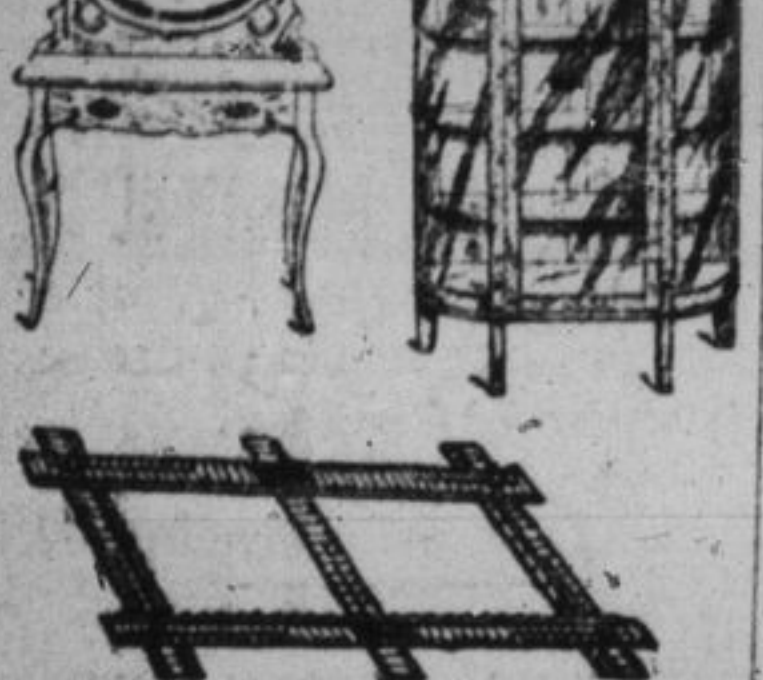

CRAZED WITH DRINK

JAMES BLAKE MADE BRUTAL ATTACK ON JOSEPH FRIEND.

Pleaded Guilty in the Police Court and was Fined \$15 and Costs, or Two Months in Jail—Three Drunks in Line-up on Thursday.

Crazed with drink, James Blake, a young man, made a brutal attack on Joseph Friend, at the corner of King and Princess streets, late on Monday afternoon. In the police court, on Wednesday morning, Magistrate Farrell imposed a fine of \$15 and costs, or two months in jail. Friend was kicked on the leg, and also received several severe blows in the face. He was in a serious condition, and had to be attended by Dr. Richardson. The latter gave evidence in the case, when it was called in the police court.

Blake had never been in trouble in the police court before. He pleaded guilty to the serious charge, but when the magistrate asked him for an explanation of his conduct, he said that he did not know why he had acted in such a manner. He remembered having a few drinks, but did not remember anything else that happened after that.

The police got a call just after the assault took place. When a couple of constables reached the scene, Blake ran away, but was rounded up by Constable Armstrong, one of the lively spirits on the force.

Evidence in the case was offered by Dr. Richardson, Constable Arniel and the complainant.

The magistrate pointed out to Blake just how serious the charge was, and the narrow escape he had from answering to a more serious charge. Blake had made the attack upon Friend without any cause whatever, and any other person might have been attacked in the same manner.

Friend came here a few weeks ago from Ottawa, where he was discharged from St. Luke's hospital, after a severe illness. He was in a very weak condition, and the doctors ordered him to come to Kingston for a change.

His trip to the Limestone city, however, was a rather unfortunate one for him. Friend told the magistrate that his home was in Brooklyn, N.Y.

Three drunks were in the line-up. They were rounded up by the police on Tuesday afternoon.

Robert Hutton came first. His story was that he had only been in the city since Monday, and that he had been endeavoring to get work. He had walked here from Belleville. He was given a chance to go to work, or leave the city.

Frank Smith and George Duff were "also drunks." Both were fined \$1 and costs.

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HAMMOND IS REFUSED

PERMISSION TO TIE UP TO WHARF OVERNIGHT.

Other Boats Were Constantly Coming Into Port, and Shifting of Crafts Was Necessary—Is No Friction.

It was understood that Captain George Hammond of the steamer Lamonde, which plies between here and Clayton, N.Y., was having some trouble with the N.Y.C.R.R. at Clayton about using their dock there.

Spoken to about it he said that the company had refused him permission to tie up at the dock over night, but that it could not refuse him permission to land passengers there as it was beyond its power to do so. He said the boat laid over night at the Nightingale dock. It was thought that there was friction between the company and Capt. Hammond, but he said that the reason he had been refused permission to lay there over night was the fact that other boats were coming there and it meant a constant shifting. No boats were allowed to stay over night at the wharf.
