Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of land in the Dominion of Canada, Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Office, Agassiz, B.C., or at the district entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of the years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 50 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father or mother or by his dependents.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$100 per acre, to be paid up on the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homesteading, provided the time required to earn a homestead patent and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead rights and has obtained a pre-empt may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside on the land and cultivate the same, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
