NOT WISE TO ABOLISH YET ANOTHER OFFER
FROM SEYMOUR COMPANY CONCERNING WATER POWER.

THE GAS AND ELECTRIC METER RENTAL RATES.
The Light, Heat and Power Committee Agreed on This—A Rest Fund Must First be Established.
It is practically certain that gas and electric meter rates will be retained for at least another year or two. The light, heat and power committee, at their meeting Tuesday afternoon, Aids. Elliott, Hanley, Hart, McCann, Rigney and Toye were present, was unanimous in the opinion that it was inadvisable at present to abolish these rates, because the plant needs all the money it could receive for renewals and for the nucleus of a rest fund. During the next year \$24,000 will be required for renewals, which must be paid for out of revenue.
Mayor Graham some time ago asked the committee to report upon the advisability of striking off the meter rates. A report upon this matter was prepared by Manager Folger, and read at the meeting. It was signed by the manager and the chairman, and recommended that the meter rents be retained. Last year these rents amounted to \$5,638. The plant renewals required were a new gas generator, some gas mains, and a purifier. Before any further reduction in rates was made, the report emphasized the necessity of putting the plant in an efficient state of repair.
Ald. Elliott said that it would no doubt be a most popular move to drop the meter rentals, but it would not be a wise one. He had not noticed any clamor of the people for the abolition of these rates. Only a few aldermen, led by the mayor, seemed to be making the agitation. Perhaps the mayor's statement was made on the spur of the moment, without due regard to the conditions prevailing in the department. The plan to retain the meter rents and to run the department on a business basis was best. It was out of question for the committee to be running to the people every year or two for money by debentures for the plant. Another thing was the necessity of establishing a rest fund. Such a fund was to be inaugurated this year, and if the meter rents were cut off it would be more difficult to establish this fund.
Ald. Toye pointed out that while the plant last year had a surplus of \$18,000 it was not a cash surplus. Most of that money was used to pay back the accumulation of debt.
Ald. Rigney said he would favor retaining the rental, if the money derived from it was placed in the rest fund.
Ald. McCann did not see how it was possible to make any reduction in the revenue this year. He considered the report of the chairman and manager a most reasonable and businesslike one.
Ald. Hart agreed with the report and preferred to see a good rest fund established before cutting off the meter rentals.
It was decided not to report to council for another two weeks, as it is desired to bring in at the same time a proposition regarding a rest fund.

TO SECURE THE CENSUS
FORTY-ONE QUESTIONS WILL BE ASKED BY MEN.
Kingston and County Enumerators Ready to Start out on Their Rounds on Thursday—Penalty for False Information.
To-morrow, the Dominion government census department will commence its work, and the enumerators for the Kingston district, will start out on their rounds. Commissioner John M. Elliott has his staff ready to work in the city, and R. J. Vair, the county commissioner, also has his men ready to "write-up" the county.
The census enumerators will be a regular interrogation mark; they will ask more questions than the average newspaper reporter, but they will ask no more than the law requires. As stated in the Whig some time ago, the information will be kept private, so no person need fear giving the information which is desired.
All the questions must be answered—\$100 having been fixed, to be imposed upon all found guilty of giving false information to the department.
The following will act as the enumerators in Kingston:
John Walker, Michael Campbell, William Trenhaile, Ignatius Crowley, Robert Allen, Wm. McDonald, William Pillar, Frederick W. Clow, Calvin W. Day, James B. Gordon, C. W. Warwick, Frank X. O'Connor, William Blomley, Joseph W. Henstridge.
The census department made public the series of questions which will be asked by the enumerators. No less than forty-one questions will be asked. For instance, among the questions which will be asked are whether the citizen is an idiot or silly, crazy or lunatic, blind, deaf or dumb. He must say whether he can read or write and what is the language he commonly speaks. Not only must he give his total earnings during 1911 from his chief source of livelihood, but he must give his income from any side lines he may have. The amount of his life, accident and sickness insurance will be required, and he must say how much he paid for his policies. In addition to a series of questions regarding employment, he will be asked how long he worked last year and how much of that time was taken up in the ordinary occupation or his side business.
Supporting the woman of the house is the only one at home when the enumerator calls, the first question to be fired at her is "What is your sex?" She must say whether she is single, married, divorced or legally separated; how many children she has living, how many are dead, and the like of that. The questions set down for finding out place of birth and country thereof are very full, and the religion of each family must be given.
Taken in all, the census taking this year promises to be a much more elaborate affair than the preceding one ten years ago. The limit of inquisitiveness seems to have been reached.
