UNFAIR TO PITTSBURG

TO TAX IT FOR PURCHASE OF STORRINGTON ROAD.

D. D. ROGERS Tells of the Amount of Money Pittsburg Years Ago Spent in Buying Up Its Own Toll Roads.
 Kingston, May 30.—(To the Editor): As the ratepayers of the township of Pittsburg are much surprised at the decision of the arbitrator taxing Pittsburg with one-third of the cost of the purchase of the Storrington toll road, a few facts in connection with the matter might be acceptable to your readers at this time.

"The road was purchased last year at a cost of \$12,500 (a price generally considered excessive), and a by-law passed at the November session of the county council confirming the same, and naming Judge Price as arbitrator to apportion the amount each township should pay towards the purchase and maintenance of said road.
 The by-law was already devised with the hope of making other townships pay an unjust portion thereof. The evidence was based mainly on the record of two days' travel, which was not fair, as the travel was not at all normal, as the Cataragui Bridge Co. for a time charged those living in the rear of the township full toll of 10c, which never was done before, and many travelled that way for a few days which they never had done or will do when the toll is reduced to what it was before.
 In the purchase of toll roads, the government pays one-third of the cost, leaving \$8,333 for the townships to pay. Pittsburg's share will be \$2,845 (one-third) payable in debentures of twenty years' standing. Our share will be over \$1,600.

In considering the case, no allowance was made that Pittsburg thirty-five years ago bought up all her toll roads, over twenty-five miles, without any government aid, and did not attempt to devise any scheme to get other townships to help us pay for them. We made them free to every one and have kept them in a better state of repair than they were when we bought them, and much better than the toll roads in other parts of the county.
 Our expenditure on our roads for the past thirty-five years (according to government returns) has been over \$75,000, double as much as any other township in the county; also our portion of the cost of the subway was over \$1,200.
 We also relinquished our share in the York Road—which should have been a valuable asset—and bore considerable of the cost of arbitration and purchase of other toll roads.
 After all that we are saddled with the burden of nearly \$5,000 for toll roads in another township, and still have the extortionate toll of 10c on the Cataragui bridge (A more appropriate name for it would be Corduroy.)

The verdict of the arbitration has to be confirmed by the county council in June session, and I mistake very much the spirit of fair play that actuates the members of council if they do not give the whole matter just consideration.—D. D. ROGERS.

Would Awaken Municipal Clerks.

Because he is hampered and prevented from doing his work by the dilatoriness and refusal of treasurers of municipalities to make returns to him, J. W. Sharpe, provincial municipal auditor, asks the government in his annual report to pass special legislation making it compulsory for the treasurer to make the returns. He also asks for special legislation to attain a uniform system of municipal accounting. He draws attention to the fact that the municipal auditors receive little remuneration, and that the time necessary to make the returns for the government is not considered when their salaries are fixed. Local auditors, he says, should not be content with making a careful scrutiny of the municipal accounts. The result of their examination should be set out in their reports, with detail, clearness and simplicity, so that each taxpayer may readily understand the financial history of the municipality. An exhaustive audit is good, but with publicity added, it constitutes the best check upon possible error, speculation or extravagance.

HAVE TWO ELECTIONS

GOVERNMENT MAY BRING IN MEASURE ON REAPPORTMENTING.

Opportunities for Obstruction on Reapportionment Bill and Redistribution Place Government Practically at Mercy of the Minority.
 Ottawa, May 30.—Two general elections in Canada within the course of the next twelve months are likely, if the political strategists of the opposition have their way. It is apparent that the first object they have in view is to compel an election this coming fall on the reapportionment issue, before allowing the government to pass the redistribution bill, re-allotting the parliamentary seats according to the figures of the June census, and giving the pro-reapportionment party probably thirty new members. By holding up supply and preventing the acceptance from coming to a vote through debating it in the commonsense for an indefinite period they can, as has already been explained, easily compel the government to appeal to the people to solve the deadlock.

By adopting obstructive tactics on the promised redistribution bill, by taking advantage of the government's need of supplies to carry on the administration, and by pleading that a refusal to pass the bill is justifiable because of alleged unfairness, they hope to compel an election with the redistribution bill unpassed, and at the same time shift the onus therefor upon the government for the reasons above given. The lack of any form of closure, practically leaves the majority in parliament at the mercy of a minority insistent on debating terms as to the time and issue of a general election. Thus a first election could be compelled on the reapportionment issue this autumn.
 If the government is sustained, then at the first session of the new parliament, when the necessary redistribution bill again comes up and is put through, the next logical demand would be for another election in accordance with the new allocation of seats. And by adopting the same species of obstruction (another appeal to the country would be rendered necessary, even if it were not brought on voluntarily by the government. Thus the opposition would have two bites at the cherry, and on the second trial they would not have to fight public sentiment in favor of reciprocity.

Such a condition of affairs makes plain the necessity for the introduction of some form of closure in the Canadian parliament, so as to prevent henceforth what has now become a practically minority rule. It is probable that when parliament re-assembles the government will reluctantly bring in a measure to secure at least some form of shutting off the debate when it has developed into pure obstruction. There is little hope of its going through in the present temper of the opposition, but it would be an issue in the campaign, and if the government is sustained it would be a mandate to press it through the house in the first session of the new parliament.

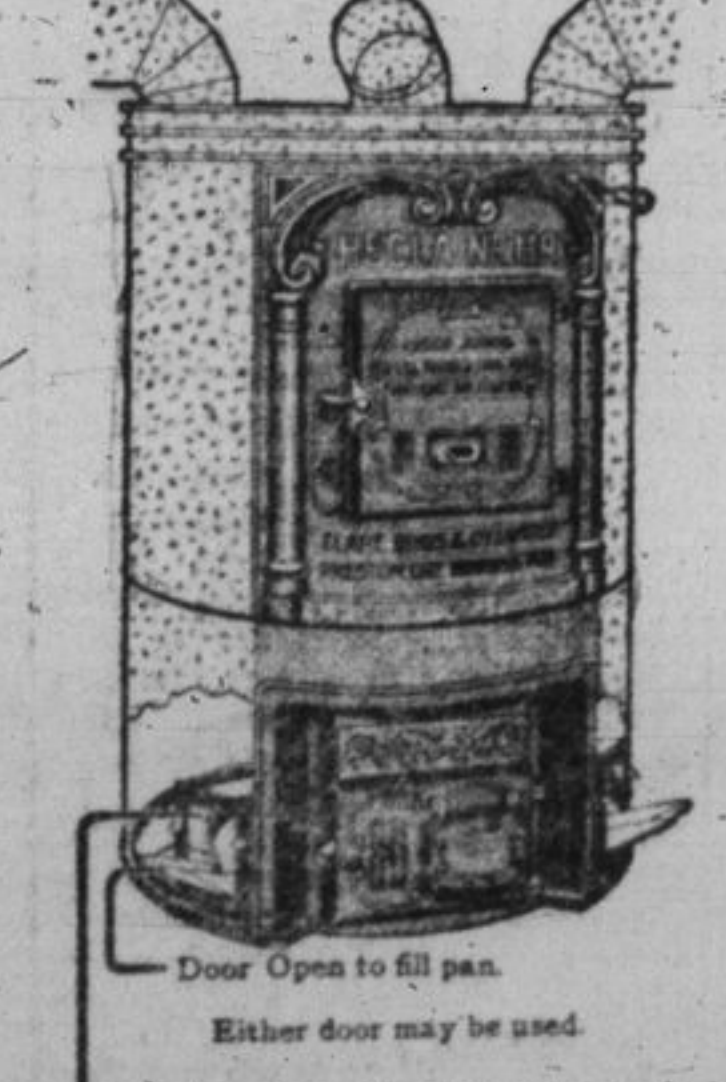

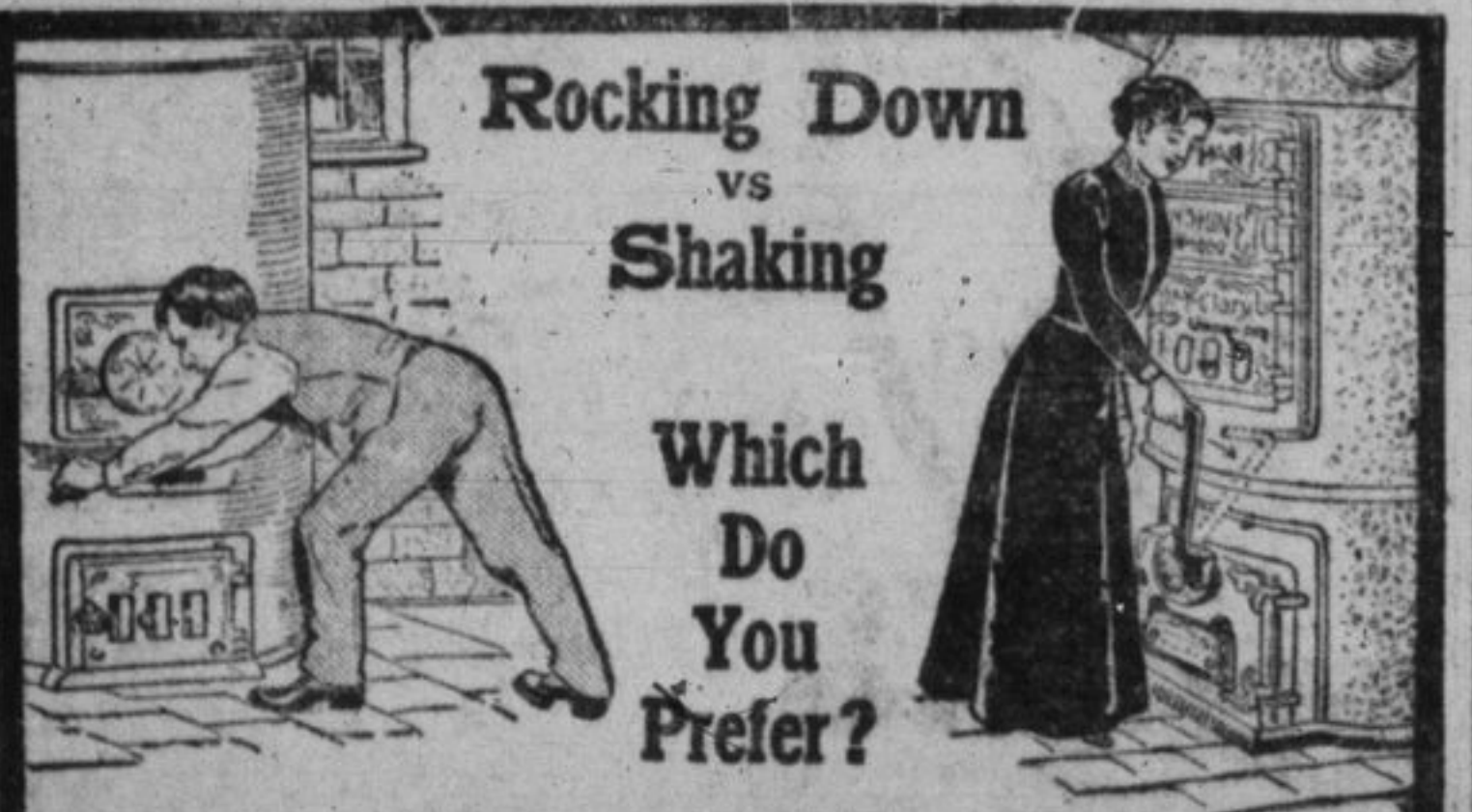
