IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Arrivals and Departures of Vessels at This Port.

The steamer Dundee will pass down on her way to Montreal to-night. The steambarge Navy cleared for Oswego to load coal for Napanee.

The schooner Keewatin arrived at the wharf with coal from Oswego. The tug Madcap is at Crawford's wharf, loading a general cargo for Emerald.

The schooner Major Ferry, discharging coal at the penitentiary, cleared for Oswego to-day. The steamer Turret Court is due at Richardson's elevator to-day, with grain from Fort William.

The steamer Jesse, loaded with coal, from Oswego, passed down on her way to Smith's Falls. At Swift's wharf: The steamer Belleville is due this evening on her downward trip; the steamer Dundurr, due to pass up this evening; the steamer Lamond is up from Clayton, N.Y., to-day; the steamer Aletha was down from bay ports to-day; the steamer Rideau King came in from Ottawa this afternoon; the schooner Bertha Calkins cleared this morning for Oswego to load coal.

M. T. Co.'s elevator: The tug Hall, from Montreal, four light barges; tug Emerson, from Montreal, with oil barge No. 6, cleared for Port Dalhousie with oil barge No. 6 and barge Selkirk; the steamer Windsor cleared for Oswego, with barge Cornwall, and both will load coal for Montreal; the steamers Amos and Turret Court are due to-day from Fort William, to discharge grain; the tug Thomson cleared for Montreal, with three grain barges.

APRIL AND MAY EXPORTS

Were \$73,162.40, an Increase over Other Years.

The report of United States Consul Johnson for April and May show an increase in exports from this place. The following are the figures: Animal hair, \$517.86; cream, \$456; feldspar, \$9,669.64; fertilizers, \$369.63; fish, \$4,557.14; furs, \$1,238.95; hay, \$6,860.58; hides and skins, \$26,940.45; horses, \$225; household goods, \$5,555; iron, pig iron, \$495; lumber, \$5,412.12; mica, \$1,032.70; plumbago, \$5,336.74; scrap rubber, \$1,053.41; vessel repairs, \$1,762.68; wooden models, \$225; returned American goods, \$893.48; total, \$73,162.40.

TO-SUBMIT THE BY-LAW

For Purchase of Cataract Bridge by the City.

Mayor Graham has requested the city solicitor to prepare a by-law for the purchase of Cataract bridge by the city, so that it can be given a second reading by the city council next Monday evening, and provision made for submitting it to the people as soon as possible. The by-law will be voted upon by the ratepayers within a month, and it is a foregone conclusion that it will be carried, as it is agreed to be in the interests of the harbor that the bridge should be owned by the city, so that a larger span can be placed in it this year, if at all possible.

Collision of Two Rigs.

Street watering cart No. 19 came in contact with a delivery wagon belonging to Bradley's delivery, on Wednesday morning, in front of A. C. Waggoner's store, on Wellington street and as a result the delivery man will have to get a new wheel for his wagon. The driver of the delivery wagon said it was the fault of the driver of the watering cart while the other said the opposite. The roadway is being torn up at this place and this was in a large measure responsible for the accident.
