SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any person 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions. If father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the landholder.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$200 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-empted six months in each of six years from date of homestead. (Including the time required to cultivate fifty acres extra.)

homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-empt may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 100 acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

QUITE LIVELY STORM

BUT NO GREAT DAMAGE HAS BEEN REPORTED.

Lightning Played Some Queer Tricks—Great Many Trees Suffered—Firemen Had Call in the Pouring Rain—Severe Hail Storm in Some Parts.

Kingston experienced quite a storm on Wednesday afternoon, and although no very serious damage was reported it was quite lively while it lasted.

The storm set in about four o'clock and for a time there was quite an electrical display. Shortly after it started lightning put street car No. 15 out of business and gave the passengers a display of fireworks.

The wind storm was quite severe for a time and trees in all parts of the city suffered as a result. A couple of trees on Johnson street were struck and stripped by the lightning.

Out on the Bath Road it is reported that the storm was very severe. Several chimneys were blown down and trees deprived of branches. In this district it is also reported that there was quite a hail storm. Glass was broken in some of the windows. Lightning struck an oak tree near the Bath Road and split it in two.

The telephone system suffered, and also the fire alarm system. Chief Armstrong and Capt. Reid were out for several hours in the evening tracing up the trouble, and they had quite a time.

An alarm of fire was sent in to the station just after the storm set in, and the firemen had a run in the pouring rain. The call came from Oberdorfer's cigar factory, on Ontario street. Some tobacco leaves were being burned in the yard, when a gust of wind carried the fire on to the roof of the building of Suman & Co., setting fire to the roof of the building and also a big bale of rope. The firemen soon had the blaze extinguished, and there was practically no damage.

The lightning played its usual queer tricks, but as far as can be learned no very serious damage was done. The rain will be welcomed by the farmers. Old Probs. is certainly giving the farmers the best of weather to bring bumper crops.

Reports received from Elginburg state that the hail storm there did a great deal of damage. A stretch of land covering over ten miles from the lake was visited by the worst hail storm in years and it is stated that trees were stripped of their leaves and other damage was done, including the smashing of windows.

A barn, owned by a farmer named Frederick Barnett, is reported to have been partially blown down and it is also reported that damage was done to a driving shed.

Lightning struck the barn owned by Reuben Spooner, at "The Elms," Glenburnie, but luckily the barn did not catch fire. Several boards were blown off.

Near Cataragui, the residence of James McCrow suffered, nearly every window in it being broken. A. B. Shewell's barn in the same district was blown down. Some damage was done to Arthur Day's house on the Bath Road and also to the cheese factory. The storm seemed to centre itself around that section.

ON DEEP DIVING. A Depth of Two Hundred and Ten Feet Can be Reached.

In an article on diving that excellent work, the New Encyclopedia Britannica, says: "The greatest depth at which useful work has been performed by a diver is 182 feet, the level at which Angel Erastoff recovered silver bars worth \$45,000 from the Syro, sunk off Cape Faidherbe; Alexander Lambert salvaged \$350,000 from the Spanish mail steamer Alphonse XII, sunk in 162 feet of water off Las Palmas; and in 150 feet W. Ridiard recovered \$250,000 in silver from the Hamilton Mitchell, which foundered on the Chinese coast. Sponge fishers never go below 150 feet and pearl divers never below 120 feet. Experiments made by two officers of the British navy under the supervision of a naval architect, who assumed no small responsibility and must have been very glad to see them reappear on the surface, showed that it was possible to reach in diving dress a depth of 210 feet, where the pressure of the water is about 90 pounds to the square inch, but men working under water, either in a caisson, a diving bell, or a diving dress, must be subjected to an air pressure exceeding the water pressure, and increasing by one atmosphere, or 15 pounds per square inch for every 33 feet of submergence, so that in the experiments mentioned the air pressure was nearly 110 pounds per square inch.

WOOD AND CONCRETE. Combination to Take Place of Iron Rods and Wires.

G. O. Cases, an English engineer, has suggested a novel type of reinforced concrete, in which wooden beams and laths take the place of iron rods and wires. The new material, which is known as ligno-concrete, is intended for use as a substitute, not for ferro-concrete in general, but chiefly for wood as employed in the construction of roofs, footways, posts, etc. The wooden parts act as traction members, and the concrete as a compression member.

It has been demonstrated by experiments that ligno-concrete is as strong as ferro-concrete when the wooden beams of the former have a cross-section which makes them as strong as steel bars of the latter. The tensile strength of steel is eight or nine times that of wood, but steel is ten to fifteen times as strong as timber. Hence ligno-concrete, if it proves durable, may advantageously be substituted for ferro-concrete in many cases. The question of durability can be decided only by time and experience, but the many known instances of the permanence of wood protected by cement indicate that the decision will be favorable.

AT AGE OF SEVENTEEN The Prince Will Enjoy Royal Curtsy.

In England, as all those Canadians are aware who, frequenting London society, have been brought into contact with royalty curtsies have to be made by women, not only to the two queens and to the princess on the reigning house, but also to the king and to the prince. The curtsy is, however, not made to the royal prince until they grow up. Although the Prince of Wales will not attain his majority (at the age of eighteen) until June 23rd, 1912, that is to say, more than a year hence, the king and queen have caused it to be known that after his seventeenth birthday, namely, next month, it is expected that the token of deference indicated in a curtsy will be paid to him by the women he meets. He is also addressed as "Sir" by all of his father's subjects, just in the same way as his only sister, Princess Mary, although still in short skirts, is addressed as "Madam," even by elderly dowager peeresses, who have known her mother since the latter's childhood.
