THE LABOR TROUBLES

UNION MEN REFUSING TO WORK WITH NON-UNION.

Some Carpenters Have Objected—A Quarter of a Million Dollars Worth of Work Kept Back in Kingston.

The local labor troubles do not seem to be nearing an end yet. Although the masons and stonecutters have decided to sink their differences and return to work, trouble appears from another quarter. Non-union labor has been engaged on various buildings, and carpenters say they will not work with non-union labor. Some of them refused to work on a dwelling house, on Wednesday, for that reason. If there is a general protest against non-union labor being employed, the building trade will receive another serious setback.

At the present time a quarter of a million dollars' worth of building is being delayed by labor troubles here. Some buildings that should be started are being delayed because of the uncertainty of labor conditions. The Royal Military College dormitories, the post office extension, the new public school and the Bank of Commerce are some of the buildings delayed. Two \$10,000 residences, to have been erected here this season, are held up, owing to labor troubles. A Kingston man interested in building, said that it might sound strange, but in Toronto, cheaper labor could be secured in construction work than in Kingston.

A Shameless Infant.

Weekly Sun. In a statement, issued by a firm of financial brokers in Toronto, we are informed that the annual earnings of the Dominion Iron and Steel company on its preferred stock have varied from thirteen per cent. in 1906 to thirty-two per cent. in 1910. The average earnings on preferred for the past four years amounts to thirty per cent.

This statement includes the income received from bounties paid by the Dominion government, but, excluding these bounties altogether, we are assured by the authority quoted that the average income for the three years, 1907-09, represented about twenty per cent. on preferred stock. In ten months of the present financial year the company has, after providing for ordinary operating expenses, met interest on bonds, amounting to \$678,504; has set aside \$419,986 for sinking fund, depreciation, etc.; paid dividends of \$291,666 on preferred stock; made special appropriations of \$500,000, and on top of all this the company has added \$311,150 to its surplus. The amount added to surplus during the ten months is sufficient to pay four per cent. dividends on the common stock, amounting to \$20,000,000, pretty much all of which is water.

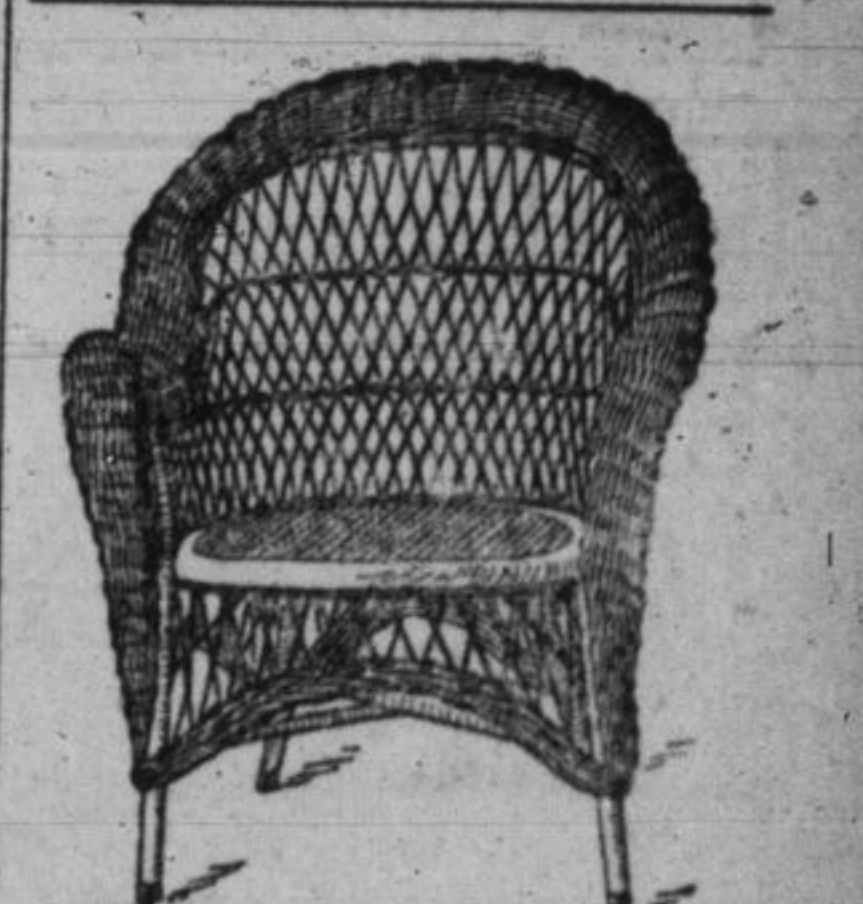
