Justice Harlan, of the American su preme court, protests against the efforts of his colleagues to practically amend an act of congress by declaring that 'it shall be interpreted "in the light of reason." This is a plausible phrase but it could easily lead to mischief. Congress ought to be supreme in the legislative branch of government; and the only business of the courts is to see that its decisions are carried into effect. They perform another duty, however, in seeing to it that congress does nothing unconstitutional. But when they attempt to rule that certain enactments of congress shall not apply when the court regards them as "unreasonable," they are going a long distance toward assuming legislative functions.
