A HAZARDOUS ATTEMPT

TO LOCATE THE ALASKA BOUNDARY LINE.

Canadian Survey to be Made—A Party of White Men and Indians Will Leave Ottawa This Week.

Ottawa, May 31.—Some idea of the dominion of Canada and of the work of its various departments of government can be gained from the work about to be undertaken by Noel Ogilvie of the department of the interior, and a party of fifteen white men and a number of Indians who leave Vancouver this week to locate the Alaska boundary line from a point inland from Kakutat Bay to the intersection of the 41st meridian.

It is to be one of the most hazardous attempts ever attempted by the Dominion survey. The party will sail from Vancouver, and the United States government has agreed to remit the duties on all the supplies being shipped in for the explorers by the Canadians.

The route inland and to the base of the towering Mount St. Elias is forty miles, and extends along the great Malespina glacier. The party will not be able to reach Mount St. Elias this season. It will be a most difficult journey, up hill all the way, and over ice-fields that will try the men's endurance. They will be divided into groups and roped together, as there are many dangerous crevasses in the glacier.

The first part of their journey will be practically the same as that followed by the Duke D'Albazzini when he successfully attempted the ascent of Mount St. Elias. They will carry oil stoves with them, as there is no timber to be found in the territory they will travel through.

QUEEN MARY'S CROWN

Has Been Completed According to Designs of Her Majesty.

London, May 31—Queen Mary's crown has just been completed. It is according to her own design, with an elegant lace-like tracery wholly in diamonds, the Kohinoor being set in the centre. The crown weighs nineteen ounces, the queen having insisted that it should not exceed the weight of an ordinary hat. It will be used only at the coronation. After that ceremony the gems will be dismantled and used in separate articles of jewelry. The king will wear his father's crown.

REPORT ON TUBERCULOSIS.

Damp, Dirt, Dust, Drink, Dissipation and Destitution.

Ottawa, June 1.—One of the interesting reports made to the government from time to time is that of Dr. F. Montizambert, director-general of public health, and in his latest account of the conditions prevailing in the dominion he dealt at some length with the question of tuberculosis. Dr. Montizambert is a strong upholder of four cardinal principles in connection with the white plague. He states that tuberculosis is not hereditary, that it is infectious, that it is curable, and that it is preventable. On this question he says in the report he made recently to Hon. Sydney Fisher:

"I am more and more convinced yearly that consumption is mainly spread from the homes of those wage earners who live under the least favorable sanitary conditions, helped doubtless by the six 'D's,' damp, dirt, dust, drink, dissipation and destitution. It is there that the fight against it has to be made if it is ever to succeed and the disease be eradicated or even markedly diminished."

The hospital for advanced cases and the sanitoriums are good in their way for the help of the few, but even the sanitorium only reaches at the best incipient cases after they are already so far advanced as to be readily recognized. We must go further back than that. We must get at the homes of the incipient cases and the youngest members of their families while still uninjured. This can be done only by the domiciliary visit, to follow notification, to the health officer, or the diagnosis at the dispensary that the cold or cough for which a cough mixture is sought is really due to tubercular trouble. The visitor to the home should be a woman. She can talk to and persuade the mother as no mere man could do. She can impress upon her the four cardinal facts which form a silver lining to the cloud which has so long shadowed us; that tuberculosis is not hereditary, that it is infectious, curable and preventable. Persuade her to adopt the open-air life for herself and her household; get her to improve the sanitary conditions in and around her home, and to allow the younger members of the family to be medically examined, and the most stringent precautions carried out in the case of anyone of them who shows any tendency towards the development of tuberculosis. Thus and thus only can we hope to get at this disease at its source and origin, and thus and only may we hope to ever stamp it out."
