

> HYDRO-ELECTRIC ENGINEER Is Here to Consult With Regard to

Power Question. P. B. Yates, one of the Hydro-Electric commission engineers, is here to consult with Ald. Elliott, chairman of the civic light, heat and power committee, with regard to power for Kingston. Last week, the chairman wrote the Hydro-Electric commission head office in Toronto, that the city was getting tired of waiting for an offer, and if 'the commission wanted to be of service to Kingston it would have to make its quotations at once, or a deal would be closed with the Seymour company.

Mr. Yates has been sent here to take up the matter again. He was here at the time Hon, Adam Beck came down to address a public meeting in the city hall, and reported to his chief that Kingston required 4,100 horsepower. This estimate is disputed by the light, heat and power committee. "It is not an estimate of power we want," said Ald. Elliott. "We want to know how much power each manufacturer will agree to take and sign an application for. An estimate is worthless. I do not think the city will use half of the amount that has been estimated for the Hydro-Electric
