## CALLS IT MAD VENTURE

### THE TRIP OF BERNIER TO THE HUDSON'S BAY.

By the North-East Passage—A United States Opinion of Canada's Claim to Jurisdiction of Hudson's Bay and Northern Waters.

Boston, June 3.—Canada is making a desperate effort this summer to establish a claim to everything north of it and incidentally to have Hudson's Bay acknowledged as a mare's nest, under its jurisdiction, says The Chicago Record-Herald.

This is the interpretation placed by New Bedford whalers on the dispatching by the Dominion government of Capt. Bernier with the revenue cutter Arctic to penetrate the north-west passage—a trip accomplished but once before.

If the Canadian boat accomplishes all it aims to do it will find four New Bedford whalers under command of Capt. George Comer, Capt. Cottle, Capt. Bodfish and Capt. Foley, now known to be in northern waters, and compel them to take out Canadian fishing licenses.

In this move of the Canadian government American whalers see the outlines of a policy inspired by desperation, the determination to make a last stand against the freedom of American boats in northern waters.

### Chased Comer Two Years.

Meanwhile in the weather beaten gathering places along the New Bedford waterfront whaling captains who have matched fortunes in search of the mammoth of the seas smile and comment with a significant twinkle of the eye. "Well, the last time they caught Comer up there the Canadians had two cutters in the water, chased him for two years, and a half, and finally induced him to give up \$50,000. But it cost them \$150,000 to turn the trick."

In this game of chance the last touch of uncertainty is not lacking. Astounding as the fact may be, there has never been any official ruling regarding that immense inland sea, Hudson's Bay. In all the international dealings of the United States and Canada it has never been officially decided whether or not Canada owns the bay.

In the various appointments of northern territory there are a dozen important tracts of land and water whose ownership is in dispute. Years ago Behring Sea was surveyed and the United States was proclaimed sovereign of a part of the contiguous to Alaska. An imaginary line running from the westernmost point of the point of the Aleutian islands almost due north marks the boundary of the sovereignty of the United States on that sea.

On the other hand the great icy expanses of the Arctic ocean are still the free domain of any adventurous sailor who may navigate its waters. From Behring Straits eastward to the islands extending out hundreds of miles to the north and west of the old north-west passage are thousands of miles of water over which no law has ever yet obtained.

### Take Their Chances.

The attempts of the Canadian government to control the Arctic ocean have been a joke to the hardy New Bedford whalers. With no officially declared law in existence which would compel them to pay for licenses, the whalers have taken the stand that Canada's system of collecting is no more than a privateering and that the situation smolders down to a matter of the luck and wits of the king's revenue officers. Hitherto the captains caught there preferred to pay cash rather than take the question to court.

It was discovered by the Canadians several years ago that Capt. G. Comer, one of the most intrepid prowlers of the north, was in Hudson's Bay. Two Canadian steamers, the Arctic and the Neptune, were dispatched to bring the American to terms. Since they had him cooped up in the bay it seemed comparatively easy to find Comer. They followed him about for a whole season.

### Viewed by Whalers.

When the Canadian Captain Bernier demanded of the captain that he take out a license he complied. Bernier demanded \$1,000 as the price of a fishing license. Comer beat the Canadian down to \$50 and paid the bill. That was the end of the incident.

When New Bedford whalers remember that it has cost Canada \$300,000 to collect about \$200 in fishing fees, the sending of Bernier into the immense Arctic to catch whalers seems a bit of a mad venture.

## DISGUISED AS A MAN

### AT LURE OF CIRCUS "GUS" FOR GOT MASCULINE STRIDE.

### After Eleven Years—Learned to Smoke Cigarettes and Drink Like a Man.

St. Louis, Mo., June 3.—The sound of bands and the lure of the circus parade caused "Gus" Seib to momentarily throw aside her masculine stride to-day and she was arrested for masquerading as a man. She admits she is a woman and has worn men's clothes for twelve years while searching for her husband, who, she says, deserted her in Bremen, Germany.

She declares that for eleven years of that period she was employed as a waiter in New York hotels and cafes under the name of August A. Seib. She is thirty-three years old.

Mrs. Seib says that when she arrived in New York the newspapers published her picture and a story of her trans-Atlantic chase. Thus she found it difficult to obtain employment. She donned male attire and procured a place in a restaurant. A little practice put her past suspicion and she adopted the attire for all time. She says she left New York a year ago and came to St. Louis.

While posing as a man, Mrs. Seib learned to smoke cigarettes and was accustomed to walk to the bar of a saloon with her male companions and drink a bottle with ease, grace and avidity.

Mrs. Seib came into public notice several years ago, when it was learned her cross-Atlantic chase was for none other than John Henry Hoeh, the Chicago Bluebeard, who was hanged for the murder of several wives. She says her real name is Seidenberg.

When arrested she wore light trousers, dark coat and a straw hat at a jaunty angle, showing a wealth of dark hair cut short. The woman will be sent to the police court to-morrow to answer to the charge of masquerading as a man in violation of a city ordinance.

### THE LORD'S DAY ACT.

### Have We the Right to Enforce Its Provisions?

Kingston, May 29.—(To the Editor) The above question is one of more than ordinary interest. It means much to all who love their country and desire its continued prosperity. Both civil and religious freedom are involved, and it becomes us to do some serious thinking. It is now a time to consider facts and to decide the question on its merits regardless of church creed or previously conceived opinions.

When we consider the advisability of requiring by force of civil law the observance of the "Lord's Day" by common man, naturally enquires, "From whence came this 'Lord's Day'?" To whom does it belong? To such questions most of us, zealous for what we suppose to be the law of our God, will readily answer that it is the divinely ordained Sabbath day.

The day which God commanded should be kept sacred. It is very natural that we should regard such an answer because we have been taught this from our infancy. But the only question which should concern us to-day is, what is the truth as taught by God's word and historic fact?

The Bible does indeed most emphatically command us to keep holy the Sabbath day. God with his own finger wrote the Sabbath command upon the enduring stone. This Sabbath law to which we appeal so frequently says absolutely nothing regarding the first day of the week, but it declares positively that "the Sabbath day is the Sabbath of the Lord thy God." The seventh day of the week is not Sunday.

I simply state a fact which must be evident to every Bible reader when I say that we are entirely without Scriptural authority for the transfer of the Sabbath from the seventh to the first day of the week. The change of the Sabbath was a gradual work, and it occurred in an age when many heathen rites were introduced into the church. Our "Lord's Day" rests upon a "thus saith the Lord," but upon ecclesiastical authority, and that only. This is a fact well known by many theologians. In view of the foundation upon which our Sunday Sabbath is based it seems to me that it would become us to exercise a little charity, and not be too ready to have a man prosecuted because he accommodates a customer by selling him a few cents worth of something upon our supposed holy day.

Even if Sunday were the true Sabbath of God's word it would not follow that we should compel by law its observance. Biblical Sabbath keeping is a spiritual matter and civil government is not organized for the purpose of ruling in the spiritual realm. We do not send men to parliament to dictate to us concerning the worship of God. Some of us read our Bible and we think we know how and when to worship. Our law-makers have enough to do to keep men civil without enforcing church dogmas.

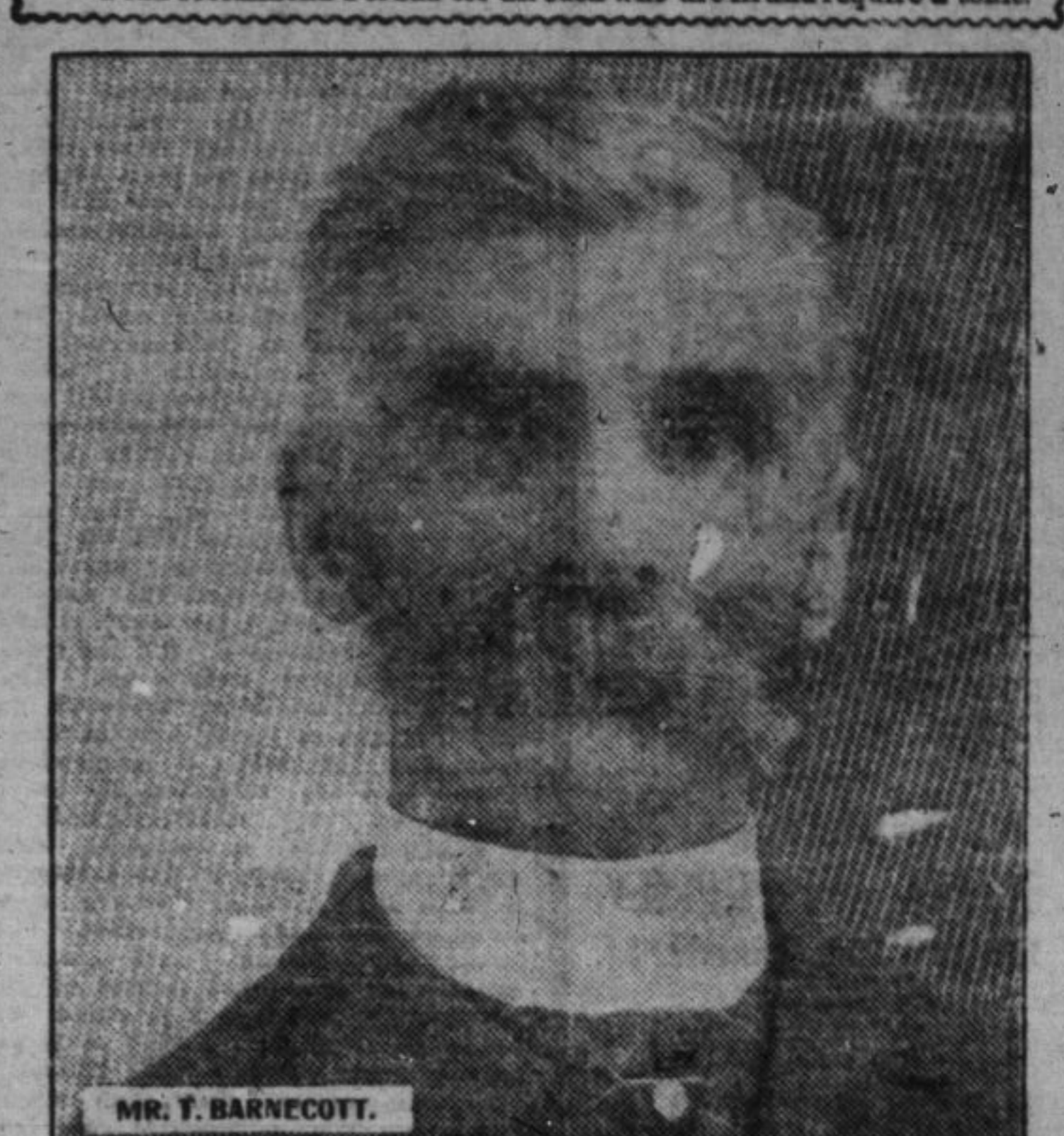
