**THE COUSIN MARRIAGES**

**LATENT DEFECTS ARE LIKELY TO APPEAR IN CHILDREN.**

Good Qualities Also—Chance of Their Reproduction in Consanguineous Marriages Are Increased.  
 London, June 6.—At a meeting of the Royal Society last week Professor Karl Pearson presented a paper on "The Cousin Marriage." It was wonderful with special reference to the marriage of first cousins. A detailed examination of the history of a large number of such marriages showed that whenever an evil factor of the Mendelian recessive type is of fairly common occurrence in a family, a first cousin marriage is likely to produce more defective offspring than any other kind of marriage.

The Bicycle Coming Back to Stay, it Appears.

 A recent motor car show a group of the "good old bicycle days." They had all been bicycle men and they spoke sadly of the departed glory of bicycling. It is odd how self-centred the human animal is. Being out of the bicycle game themselves it never occurred to these men that the bicycle might be coming into its own again, and really it is fortunate that the return to favor the bicycle has been so gradual and unostentatious as to escape the attention of those whose exploitation might renew the feverish craze of fifteen years ago.

Today the bicycle business in America is what my friend from Alabama calls a "mighty pretty business." The people are buying more and more rapidly. Every manufacturer of first class bicycles is finding it a little harder each year to keep up with his order, but he knows that the bicycle is coming back to stay and he can extend his manufacturing facilities to meet the gradual increasing demand without fear of getting caught in a slump.

In Holland, eighty-five per cent. of the male population are said to be riding bicycles. There are 60,000 bicycles owned in the city of Copenhagen, Denmark. In France, over 1,000,000 bicycles are in use. In Europe the bicycle has undoubtedly come back. Even royalty is bicycling again.

**SUCCESSION DUTIES HEAVY.**

Total for May Three Times That of Last Year.  
 Toronto, June 6.—The provincial treasury is still reaping a rich harvest from succession duties. The return for May reached \$86,349.20, compared with only \$26,585.33 for the corresponding month of last year. Since the beginning of the fiscal year on November 1st, receipts from succession duties have been nearly double the total for the same months of 1909-1910. They amounted to \$610,557.36, compared with \$321,180.56 last year. It is interesting to note that the succession duty revenue for the first seven months of this financial year is more than the provincial treasurer's estimate for the twelve months of 1909-1910.

The largest single contribution came from the estate of the late Dr. Andrew Smith, for many years head of the Ontario Veterinary College. His estate paid \$33,445.55.
