IN MONTREAL CONFERENCE. There is a Membership of 39,057—Church Funds Show Increase.

Special to the Whig. Montreal, June 6.—A total membership of 39,057 in the district was reported by Rev. George Stafford, at the Montreal Methodist conference. The report also showed that 2,279 were received on probation and 1,389 by letter, 2,452 baptisms took place, 1,167 marriages were solemnized, and 1,522 burial services held. The missionary fund was augmented by \$62,779, while for the educational fund \$7,021 was raised. The Women's Missionary Society raised \$16,593. All of these figures showed a decided increase. For the fiscal year \$149,941 was paid, an increase of \$5,111. Grants to circuits within the conference from the missionary fund amounted to \$21,180, a slight decrease. For all purposes the churches raised \$550,262, an increase of \$31,427.

Rev. Dr. Briggs, of the book and publishing establishment, presented his report. The past year has been the most prosperous in the history of this conference, and the net profits were larger than ever, the superannuation fund receiving \$21,000 from the profits. Every department shared in the prosperity. The circulation of the paper increased over 2,000. The demands for additional machinery has been put in during the year.

The committee on temperance and moral reform presented its report. The Quebec government is commended for its vote on house reduction. While it commends the government of Ontario for vigorous enforcement, it calls the attention of the government to the fact that there are some commissioners and inspectors who do not take their work seriously, and urges the government to make good its promise to take the administration of party licenses, lay out of the province of party politics. The report recommended the establishment of institutions for the proper treatment of the drunkards rather than the present method of 82 and costs or thirty days. The authorities are urged to enforce the law against blasphemy and gambling in connection with the playing of pool.

JAPANESE EMIGRATION. Government to Investigate Practice of "Sending for a Wife."

Tokio, June 6.—The following is the gist of the emigration policy adopted by the Japanese government, as a result of the conference of prefectural secretaries just held at the foreign office.

The new Japanese-American treaty will in no way change the policy of restricting the emigration of the Japanese people to the mainland of the United States, Hawaii and Canada. The so-called "sending for a wife," which is getting more and more popular, is really marriage contracted by exchange of photographs. The government will hereafter investigate more strictly the application of those women who desire to go abroad in this way, because they are often deceived by people abroad seeking to hoodwink the authorities.

OUTWITTED THE STATE. Disappearance of French Church Fund Explained.

Paris, June 6.—The report of the senatorial committee which has been investigating the disappearance of church funds, explains how the milliard francs which was expected to be realized from property of the religious congregations dwindled to thirty million francs, or about enough to provide for the aged members of the orders. This amount is all that is left in the hands of the state. The report shows how the church outmanoeuvred the state and checkmated the scheme of obtaining money for the secular schools. Legal actions, sometimes to the number of thirty, were brought against the state liquidator and fought to the biggest costs, when, as generally happened, the claimants disappeared, leaving the estate liable for all the costs. The report points out that the congregations obtained the best legal advice gratuitously, while the state depended upon the divided counsel of several departments.
