STRONGHOLD ATTACKED

MANOEUVRES OF 14TH REGIMENT ON TUESDAY NIGHT.

All the manoeuvres were carried out in a most successful manner, although the darkness interfered, to some extent, with the work. Just as the proceedings were brought to a close, the moon put in an appearance, and it was very bright.

As usual, a large crowd of citizens turned out to see the "soldier boys," the pride of the entire city. Some had an idea that the regiment would be going to the cricket field, however, and they missed the parade.
