STRONGHOLD ATTACKED

MANOEUVRES OF 14TH REGIMENT ON TUESDAY NIGHT.

They Were Carried Out in Most Successful Manner at Barricaded Camp—Darkness Interfered Somewhat With Work—Church Parade and Battalion Inspection.

Close upon three hundred men were in line in the parade of the 14th Regiment, P.W.O. Rifles, on Tuesday night. The regiment marched to Barricaded Camp, where an attack was practised. The manoeuvres were arranged as follows: The blue forces, consisting of four companies, were in a strong position at the Point, and the members of the regiment, forming the red forces, were given orders to drive them off, or capture them. The attack was developed from the Country Club, the firing line being under the command of Major Low, and the supports of Capt. Birch. All the manoeuvres were carried out in a most successful manner, although the darkness interfered, to some extent, with the work. Just as the proceedings were brought to a close, the moon put in an appearance, and it was very bright.

As usual, a large crowd of citizens turned out to see the "soldier boys," the pride of the entire city. Some had an idea that the regiment would be going to the cricket field, however, and they missed the parade. The 14th Regiment, P.W.O. Rifles, will hold a church parade to the camp at Barricaded, on Sunday, June 12th. Battalion inspection will take place at the cricket field, on Tuesday evening, June 20th, when Col. Hemson, divisional commander, will be the inspecting officer.

The 14th Regiment will take part in the military tattoo at the Barricaded camp, this month. The tattoo will likely take place on the evening of June 21st. The regiment will bivouac at the ranges, and shoot there the next day.

There will be a league rifle match at the ranges on Saturday. George R. Dolan, teacher in the Collegiate Institute, has taken out a commission in the 14th Regiment.

In honor of the coronation Toronto public schools may begin the summer holidays a week sooner than usual.

The cabinet has decided not to recommend executive clemency in the case of young Jardine, under sentence of death at Goderich.
