LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

The Prices Paid at the Various Centres. Montreal, June 5.—At the West End Montreal live stock yards this morning the small run of cattle caused to soar to an advance of from 30c. to 20c. over Monday's market. The market was active, even with the few buyers present and stock sold early even at high prices asked. No poor cattle were in evidence. The receipts last week were 1900 cattle, 300 sheep, 2,275 hogs and 975 calves. To-day's receipts were 750 cattle, the sheep, 1,000 hogs, and 250 calves. Steers, top of the loads, few at \$6.50. Bids of \$6.40 were made for tops of two other loads, which were refused. Choice, \$6.25 to \$6.40; good \$6 to \$6.20; medium, \$5.75 to \$5.95. A few common yearlings about \$3.50 average. There were no poor or common steers offered. Bulls, \$9 to \$4.60. One lot of good ones sold at \$4.35. Cows, best, \$5.25 to \$5.75; medium, \$5 to \$5.25; common, \$4.50 to \$4.75. Small meats were about steady at last Wednesday's prices, and sold as follows: Old sheep, \$4 to \$4.50 yearling lambs, \$4 to \$6 each; spring lambs \$4.50 to \$6. Hogs were very active and nearly all sold early, the select lots bringing only \$6.75; medium, \$6.40 to \$6.50; rough and sows averaged \$6.25 cwt. of cars.

Pigs, \$5.55 to \$6.05; bulk of sales, \$5.95 to \$6.05. Sheep—Receipts estimated at 30,000; market steady to strong. Credle Social Reform.

Thousands to assist the immigration of foreigners, but not a cent to preserve the lives of native born children, is the arrangement of federal and provincial governments by the Ontario Medical Association. The suggestion coupled with it, that the government should pay mothers a bonus of \$5 for every child they raise to the age of five years, is rather crude, but the governments might well make a grant based on the number of children born in each municipality annually—to be devoted to the support of a modified milk scheme, or some similar aid to child life.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family or any male over 18 years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon any portion of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 20 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, in certain districts, a homesteader's good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$1.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside up to 18 months on the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres thereon.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption must enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$1.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$100.00.
