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THE ATHLETICS KNEW

OF THE CHANGE MADE TO A LIVELY BALL. Macken Adopted Style of Play Suited to New Conditions Before Other Clubs.

Cleveland, June 7.—That the stage was all set this spring for a swell start by the Philadelphia Athletics, and that this club was the first and, for a time, the only club to know of the introduction of a new amount of rubber in the American League.

It is a charge the authenticity of which is virtually admitted by a member of the Athletics as well. "When we started playing the Athletics in the spring, says this member, I noticed that the Philadelphia outfielders were cutting off what seemed sure home runs.

"It took me about three days to tumble to the fact that the difference was in the ball, and that the Athletics had adapted their game to it. We cut a ball open, compared it with a 1910 ball we happened to have, and got wise."

"Certainly we were next," said a member of the Athletics when this conversation was recounted. "Doesn't Uncle Ben Shibe, who owns the club, make the balls, and weren't we experimenting with them at every morning practice last fall?"

The increase in resiliency of the league ball was a surprise to practically every American league owner except the Athletics, Ben Johnson failing to take them into his confidence when the change was authorized.

The first President Navin knew of the change was the story printed in a newspaper, though by observation he already suspected that a change had been made.

That the Athletics were in such poor condition that they were unable to take advantage of their advance knowledge proved the salvation, in all probability of the American league race.

Russian Lion to Meet Gotch. Chicago, Ill., June 7.—The signing of articles between Frank Gotch, champion wrestler of the world, and George Hackenschmidt, the "Russian Lion," admitted the contender for the title, proved a story morsel for the sporting fans hereabouts.

According to the agreement, which was reached after months of wrangling and much side-stepping on the part of Gotch, the champion is to receive from the Empire Athletic Club, of this city, which staged the affair, about \$20,000 for his share of the purse, \$1,000 for training expenses and fifty per cent. of the picture privileges.

All Kinds of Sports. Indications now are that "Packy" McFarland will meet "Matt" Wells, the English lightweight champion, at Gary, Ind., July 4th.

James E. Gorman, of San Francisco, established a new world's revolver record at the Hell Mound range, scoring 467 for 50 shots at 50 yards on the standard American target. The former record was 465.

New York Tribune: Edward Barrow, president of the Eastern League, has shown that so long as he holds the reins senseless "kicking" and umpire "baiting" will not be permitted. It is hoped he will continue the good work.

M. J. Dunlop, the heavy hitting outfielder, was formally reinstated by the National Baseball Commission. Dunlop himself applied for reinstatement and promised to report to the New York Club immediately upon being restored to good standing.

Boxing fans from all parts of the world will watch the result of the world's middleweight championship bout in London, on Thursday, between "Billy" Papke and "Jim" Sullivan, the English title holder. It will be the first real "world" championship held in England for a generation.

Already there is such an organization in Des Moines, says Miss Linster-Lane, which has made healthy, useful girls of its members. It has taught them, among other things: First aid to the injured, nursing, cooking, sewing and home-making.

Too Many Holidays. Toronto Telegram. Canada should recognize May 24th as the one and only date on which the birthday of every reigning sovereign is publicly celebrated.

The actual date of the sovereign's natal day can be quietly and officially honored even as November 9th was honored during the reign of Edward VII.

It is fool fustianism, not true loyalty, that closes up the banks and shuts the doors of the custom houses and post offices about one week after Canada has celebrated May 24th, a holiday which the British nation will never give up, and three weeks before Canada will observe at a holiday the actual date of the king's coronation.

May 24th ought always to be recognized as the date on which Canada honors the anniversary of King Edward's birth, and no public holiday or quasi public holiday should be proclaimed in honor of the actual date of any sovereign's birthday.

Does Obstruction Pay. Montreal Herald. There is something distinctly humorous in the plight in which the members of parliament will find themselves if the obstruction extends the session beyond the date by which the members will have drawn their sessional indemnity. When the indemnity was raised to \$2,500 some six years ago, it was provided that members who absent themselves for more than fifteen days in the session must forfeit \$15 for every day of absence. Thus, after the indemnity, drawn at the rate of \$10 a day, is exhausted, which in the case of most members will occur by the end of July, the members will have to stay at Ottawa at their own expense, or stay home, subject to a daily fine of \$15.
