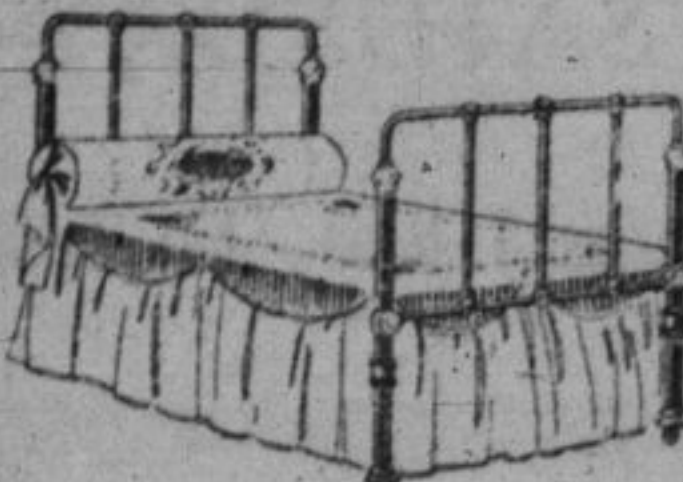

LACK OF A DAY LOAD

DISCUSSED AT CONFERENCE OVER CHEAP POWER.

Board of Trade Representatives Satisfied That the Civic Committee is Doing All Possible to Get Cheap Power.

The board of trade representatives who were present at the conference with the light, heat and power committee on Thursday evening, expressed themselves as well satisfied that the civic committee was doing everything that there would be still further delay until the Hydro-Electric commission gave the committee a definite answer.

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At present, Ald. Elliott stated that the commission's engineers were at work on the High Falls proposition, and were to make a report shortly.

Dr. Ryan stated that he was convinced the committee had done everything possible in the way of trying to get cheap power for Kingston.

H. C. Nickle, of the street railway company, addressed the conference, and gave some interesting facts concerning cost of production by steam.

The Ontario government gets \$3,981,000. The difference between the two amounts being \$500 for transfers and \$181 for fines in which the city does not participate.
