A HOLDING COMPANY
WILL PROVIDE ALTERNATIVE
TO DOUBLE LIABILITY.

Duplicate the Assets—Claims
Against Alaska Central and
Chicago and Milwaukee Will be
Utilized.
Toronto, June 9.—The Sovereign
bank, which went into liquidation
three years ago, will not be wound
up by the executor, as would be the
normal procedure.
Instead, a holding company, with
A. Jarvis, former president of the
bank, at its head, will proceed to du-
plicate the assets with a view to
providing an alternative to the pay-
ment of the double liability on their
stock.
At a meeting of the general manag-
ers and other officials of the bank's
representatives in Toronto, it was agreed
to recognize the step taken by the
shareholders. With such approval the
shareholders are now enabled to pro-
ceed with their programme. Had it
been withheld the curator would have
proceeded to have collected the double
levy, it is stated.

The intention in the Sovereign bank
case is to utilize the bank's claims
against the Chicago and Milwaukee rail-
ways, in both of which the largest in-
vestments on the books were made by
direction of former General Manager
Stewart, in the best possible manner.
Over two million dollars was placed
in bonds of the Alaskan railway, giv-
ing the bank a controlling interest in
its affairs. This road is today an ac-
tive organization and is said to pro-
mise well for the future. The same
optimism is felt in relation to the Chi-
cago and Milwaukee railway, the af-
fairs of which are now involved in a
legal dispute, for which a decision will
be given in a few days.
The holding company will be com-
posed of shareholders, all of whom
will subscribe fresh capital for the
carrying on of their interests.
Mr. Jarvis has been assured of al-
most unanimous co-operation from
his fellow shareholders, and that the
management of the new company will
be along vigorous lines.

THE LATE W. H. RANDALL
AGED EIGHTY-ONE.
Was Formerly Tax Collector—Mrs.
H. Brown Died on Friday Morn-
ing—Injury to a Lad.
Gananoque, June 9.—The death of
another of Gananoque's octogenarian
residents occurred yesterday at the
family residence, Adelaide street, in
the person of William Henry Randall;
in his eighty-first year, after an ill-
ness lasting over several months. De-
ceased resided here for many years and
was held in high esteem. He was a

ing the position of tax collector until
compelled by feeble health to resign.
He leaves a wife and two daughters,
both married. Interment will take
