IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Arrivals and Departures of Vessels at This Port.

The steamer Missisquoi was in port from Gananogue, on Saturday.
The steamer Alexandria was at Folger's wharf, Friday night from Montreal.

The steamer North King is in the Kingston dry dock to have some repairs made to her hull before starting the season.

The steamer Westmount, grain-laden, from Fort Williams due to arrive at the Montreal Transportation company's elevator on Monday, to discharge.

Owners of vessels holding coal at Buffalo which must be moved by July 1st are planning for an extension of thirty days. It is believed boats can not be profitably started before August 1st.

Two million feet of lumber is on its way from Washington to Duluth, to be shipped from that port down the lakes. Part of this shipment is for the foreign trade, going from Buffalo to New York by canal.

At Swift's wharf—the steamer City of Montreal stopped on her way down Friday afternoon, steamer Toronto made her river trip to-day; the steamer Caspian is due to make her Sunday trip to-morrow; steamer Dundurn is expected to arrive to-morrow on her downward trip; steamer Belleville is expected to-night; steamer Rideau King is expected up from Ottawa to-night; steamer Albatra was down from bay ports to-day.

WORK OF THE MISSIONS

(Continued from Page 5.)

At the Saturday-morning session of the Congregational union, Rev. Mr. Mershon led the devotional hour from nine to ten o'clock. Rev. J. T. Daley continued his morning addresses, which are so thoroughly enjoyed. At ten o'clock business was resumed. The business committee submitted the docket for this session.

Delegates were appointed to attend Toronto conference, consisting of Revs. J. W. Pedley, E. D. Silcox and H. O'Hara.

On motion, ministerial standing in the union was referred to the executive to enter into communication with the associations and report at next meeting.

The business committee was asked to draw up a suitable resolution in regard to the coronation of George V.

Rev. Dr. Schofield reported on behalf of the Peace and Arbitration Society, submitting the following resolution: "That this union desires to put on record its great satisfaction that a treaty of arbitration has been agreed upon by Sir Edward Grey and President Taft, representing their respective governments, looking to the submission of all questions which may arise between Great Britain and the United States to a board of arbitration with mutual agreement to abide by a decision of such board. We believe that the effect of such a treaty will be far-reaching, that it will do much for the extension of the principles of arbitration as a method of settling international difficulties and help the ultimate realization of permanent and universal peace. A century of peace between Canada and the United States has demonstrated that war with its terrible wastes is unnecessary between Christian nations. We, therefore, hope all our churches and people to use their influence to the promotion of peace and good-will among the nations and to discourage the spirit of national jealousy and hate."

On motion further discussion was postponed till next session.

Rev. Dr. Warriner reported on behalf of the church union committee. There was nothing specially new in the report, reference being made to the result of the action of presbyteries and conferences. The committee appointed a year ago did not feel that the time had come to make any definite report. The continuance of the committee was ordered.

The next matter taken up was the Ne Temere decree. The resolution bearing on this question has already been published. It is not necessary to say that the discussion was intensely enthusiastic. Mr. Labourer, of Montreal, was heard as to the legal aspect of the question affecting the province of Quebec. Mr. McLachlan also spoke as a registrar of marriages in Quebec. The original motion was carried unanimously. The meeting adjourned at 11.30 o'clock.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over the World.

Alexander (Bower) Robertson, of the Capital lacrosse team is dead at Ottawa.

Four men sawed through steel bars and escaped from court house jail at Syracuse, N.Y., Saturday morning.

It is denied that Andrew Carnegie, by threats, compelled the formation of the United States Steel Corporation.

At Cleveland, Ohio, a man was shot, perhaps fatally as the result of a row among strikers in a garment factory.

Jockey Phil Goldstein, riding in Canada for several seasons past, has been offered an engagement to go to Germany.

Prince of Wales was admitted to the order of the garter in the throne room of Windsor castle, Saturday. The king placed the insignia on the prince.

At Blagovishtschensk, Asiatic Russia, the Amur river steamer Miravoff Amurski, was destroyed by fire. The passengers jumped into the river and scores of persons were drowned.

Frederick Kohl, one of the richest men in San Francisco, was shot and probably fatally wounded by Miss Adele Verge, a French maid, until recently employed by Kohl's wife.

The largest steamship merger in the history of the great lakes was carried out Friday by the formation of the Great Lakes steamship company, at Cleveland. Five companies are included.

The betrothal is announced of Capt. Vierville Champion de Crepigny, fourth son of Sir Claude Champion de Crepigny and Nora, elder daughter of James Augustus MacSloy, of St. Catharines, Canada.

The bodies of a man named Hill, his wife and two children, were found in the Hill home at Ardenwald, Ore. The woman and children had been chopped to death with an axe. He had then committed suicide.

TRAVERS IS EXPECTED

To Arrive at the Penitentiary Saturday Afternoon.

A despatch from Toronto states that it is expected W. R. Travers, the Farmers' Bank manager, sentenced to six years in penitentiary, will arrive, Saturday afternoon, to begin his prison sentence here, although nearly six months of it has been served in Toronto jail, where Travers was treated more like a popular clubman. It will be remembered that three months ago Travers was secretly taken from his jail quarters and sent down here, but taken back to Toronto within twenty-four hours. When he comes again, he will be brought down as quietly. It was stated at the penitentiary that Travers might be down in the afternoon, but no definite word had been received at ten o'clock.
