

Cape Town, June 10 .- One hundred and twenty cages and crates littered the quay alongside which the Comrie Castle lies previous to her departure to-morrow. They were all labelled "His Majesty King George's Game Collection." Some had come 1,000 or more miles from the north, others from the east and the west, and they contained live animals and birds as representative of South Africa as has been possible

Not one of the animals was purchased, and they may all be regarded as coronation gifts to the king from South Africans.

A mountain zebra and foal-the case was included in the Cape collectiontained what the label described as "Sitatunga"-a sort of "bok"-was marked "Presented by Lewanika." There was another containing "Spurwinged geese," the donor being given "Letita Lawanika."

The Cape sent a very varied collection. There were blesbok, a bushbok, May be a Stylish One, But it Makes money and some valuable jewels gles, jackal buzzards, Egyptian eese, Cape partridges, rock pigeons, lack-tailed jackals, ground squirrels, with several cobras and other snakes. rabbits, a porcupine and some blacktailed jackais, with other animals. tortoise and a cockatoo. North-Western Rhodesia sent a beautifully marked leopard among its collection. Allowance has been made for a voyage lasting twenty-eight days. 
