## ORDINATION WAS HELD RECEIVED NO OFFER IT IS SIMPLY ABSURD THE WORLD'S EPISODES

IN ST. GEORGE'S CATHEDRAL ON TRINITY SUNDAY.

Three Young Men Made Deacons, Three Deacons Raised to the Priesthood—Impressive Service—Ordination Sermon Preached by Dr. Griffith Thomas.

To the solemn, gorgeous words and music of the Trinity hymn, "Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty," choir and clergy came into St. George's cathedral in procession on the morning of Trinity Sunday, the congregation joining with inspiring nervousness. Matins had been said at ten, by Canon Grout and the ordination service began, according to rubric with the sermon preached by Rev. Griffith Thomas, D.D., of Wycliffe College, Toronto. Dr. Thomas is an expository preacher, a type not so prevalent now as in former years, and gave a very minute exposition of the call of the prophet Isaiah, spoken of in the sixth chapter, his theme being the vision of God. Some of the more notable parts of his sermon were the reminder that a man could only picture that which he is within himself, that the "I saw the Lord" the vision of God, must be the key note of the Christian ministry, that it is a God of infinite power who will supply strength to meet all the arduous and various demands on His priest. Christ used two notable imperatives in His ministry and both were connected with the possession of power. "All things are delivered unto me of My Father—come." "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth—Go." The key note of the Old Testament is holiness, the key note of the New is love. Holy love makes up the character of God. To the young men entering deaconate and to those to be admitted to the high office of the priesthood, he would say "continue." The temptation comes, as the physical frames grow weaker, to allow the spiritual tides to ebb. He had heard a clergyman say that he could find no more subjects to preach about—the clergyman had been a preacher of topical sermons—but a brother priest had told him that if he spent one hour daily with his Greek Testament he would never lack for subjects—he would rather be boring for time that he might deliver some of the many messages he found there. After the sermon, the office of holy communion was proceeded with, the candidates, those for deacon orders, first, then the deacons, for the priest-hood, and finally the priests, were presented to the bishop by one of his examining chaplains. The imposition of hands followed.

The Dean of Ontario sang the litany and his lordship was celebrated, Canon Starr, epistoler. The gospel was Rev. E. Harrington, of Trinity College, Toronto, who stood first in the examination for deacons' orders. Mr. Harrington will be sent to the mission of Pittsburgh. The chancellor of the diocese, Judge McDonald, of Brockville, was present at the service and was robed in the market of the L.L.D. degree. Dr. Thomas addressed the children of the cathedral Sunday school in the afternoon, and preached again at evening, his sermon being a helpful one, especially to Sunday school workers. He illustrated Christ's way of working from the scene at the well of Samaria, and urged teachers to get the point of contact with the child, to arrest his attention, to set him thinking, and then to rouse his conscience.

Mrs. Mary Jane Glassford, whose home is on the other side of Belleville died in the hospital here, Monday, after being confined there for sometime. Her husband was expected in the city in the afternoon.

## TOWN OF 10,000 POPULATION WIPED OUT BY EARTHQUAKE

Mexico City, June 12.—Every inhabitant of Ciudad Guzman, a town of 10,000 population, is either dead, injured or homeless as a result of the recent earthquake.

Ward from there reached this city early to-day to find that many had been killed and that 1,120 houses had been destroyed and that 100

bodies had been recovered from the ruins at the time the courier left with the news. Many more dead are known to be beneath the ruins, but the work of recovering the bodies is progressing very slowly, owing to a lack of able-bodied men. Eight churches were destroyed. The rainy season is due and much suffering is sure to follow the disaster.

## DAMAGE BY THE STORM IN NEW YORK DISTRICT

Five Dead and Five Missing—Lightning Struck Ferris Wheel at a Pleasure Resort.  
New York, N.Y., June 12.—Five are dead, five are missing and a million dollars of damage is the result of the two days' storm in this district. Lightning struck the Ferris wheel at the Glason Point pleasure resort and threw the wheel axle. People, blinded by the flash, became panic-stricken and were restrained with difficulty from jumping to the ground. They were finally taken down on ladders. The telegraph and telephone wires throughout the state were put out of business completely. The companies are greatly hampered in their services.

## THAT ARCHBISHOP GAUTHIER WILL FOUND JOURNAL.

To Blindly Follow the Episcopal Directions, Which Would be Against Laurier—Statement of Dr. Dequire.

Ottawa Free Press. Dr. Dequire, parish priest of Orleans, in Russell county, passed through Ottawa, Friday on his way to the convention in Windsor, of the Union St. Joseph du Canada. Dr. Dequire, who is a well-known and influential French-Canadian priest, was asked whether he had seen the article in "La Revue Franco-Americaine" published in Montreal, in which it was stated that Archbishop Gauthier of Ottawa would, in a short time, found a great French-Canadian journal which would blindly follow the episcopal directions, which would be against Sir Wilfrid Laurier because the prime minister wanted to have Mr. Emard in Ottawa, and which would help the archbishop to assure the triumph of his national opinions? "Yes," replied Dr. Dequire, "I have read it and I frankly tell you that I cannot approve of it. Since his coming amongst us Mr. Gauthier has succeeded in winning the love of his clergy, and he is fast becoming more and more popular amongst the laity of Ottawa. And it could not be otherwise. Rev. S. Beoughlan has been selected as rector of Grace church, Toronto. Michael McCutcheon, Woodstock, Ont., was struck by a train and killed.

The United States operative millers, in session at Detroit, endorsed the reciprocity bill.

Oxford University has conferred the degree of D.C.L. upon Premier Ward Botha and Morris.

The Canadian troops for the coronation are greatly pleased with their welcome in Britain.

Rev. Dr. E. B. McLaren has been announced as the secretary of Home Missions' Emile Barnhardt, Berlin, was killed Saturday night. The wagon he was driving was struck by a street car.

Mrs. Anna Chapais, of St. Denis, Que., who has been attending the Convent de Notre Dame, will leave on Tuesday morning, for Montreal and Quebec.

Mayor C. J. Bowles, of Springfield, Ohio, has cut his own salary from \$2,500 to \$1,500 a year in order to help the city of Springfield meet its just debts.

The ships that arrived on this side last week, including the Empress of Britain, which stopped at Quebec, brought no fewer than eight thousand four hundred and six passengers.

Burglars blew open the safe in the French County Post Office, Kentucky. Fox followed the explosion, and because of a fire, thirty buildings were burned. The robbers escaped in the confusion following the fire.
