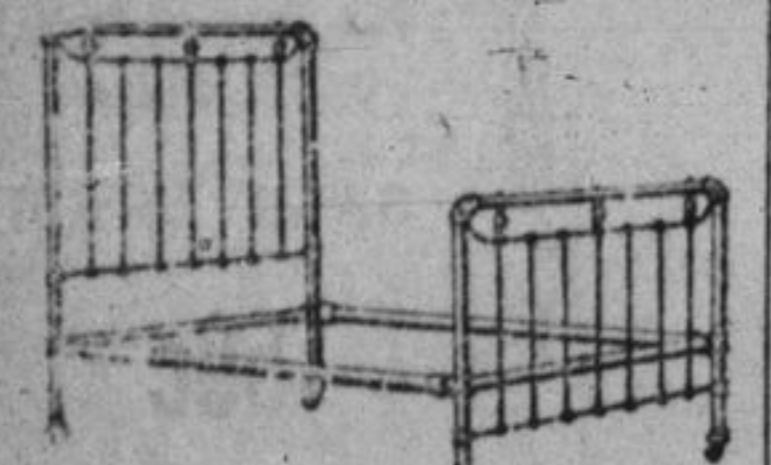

The grounds are still in a very wet condition, and the roads leading to the camp are chuck full of mud.

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LABORERS ARE PAID

TWENTY-EIGHT CENTS AN HOUR BY SOME BUILDERS.

Reply of the Secretary of the Building Laborers' Union to E. R. Beckwith—Defends George Dean.

Kingston, June 13.—(To the Editor): While reading your valuable paper last evening I found a letter signed E. R. Beckwith, in which he denies a statement made by George Dean, in a previous issue.

It is true that a motion was carried by the labor union to return to the old rate of wages, if all the contractors would sign the agreement, but they failed to show up, and at the same time some of the laborers went to work contrary to rules, and are working at the present time with non-union men.

Mr. Beckwith adds that Mr. Dean never works for contractors and has no right to a vote in the local union. Now, sir, Mr. Dean was a building laborer before he became caretaker of a church and has never been denied a vote in his union, and we consider him as much entitled to a vote in his union as Mr. Beckwith has to a voice among bona fide contractors.

I might add that the union laborers of Kingston are back to the original motion, and expect twenty-eight cents per hour for an eight-hour day on buildings. I have a letter from Ottawa stating the laborers wage is 30c. per hour, while in Toronto they go as high as 34c. per hour, so our demands are not unreasonable.
