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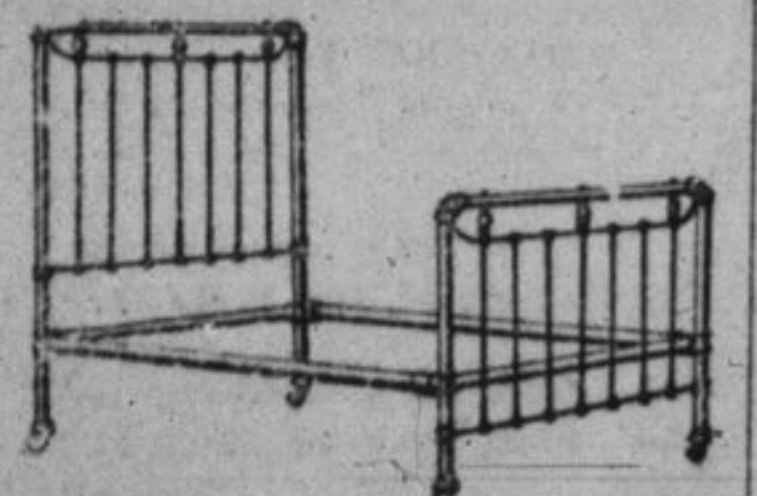

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ODDFELLOWS MEET

Forty members from various points attended.

The Membership, Increased During the Past Year as well as Assets of Lodges—Sovereign Grand Lodge for Canada.

The annual meeting of District Lodge No. 36, I.O.O.F., was held last evening in the Oddfellows hall here.

The reports for the year, presented by the different lodges, and summarized during the evening, showed that there was a total membership of 1,832, or an increase during the year of 60.

The assets of the lodges showed a gain of \$3,318 or a growth from \$62,252 a year ago to \$65,570.

During the evening some very important subjects were considered. The main question was introduced by C. R. Cotton, of Gananoque, and followed by a vigorous discussion in which a number of representatives participated.

D. M. McIntyre, of Kingston, submitted a resolution in memorial of the late grand secretary, J. B. King. It extolled his virtues, his enthusiasm in connection with the order, his devotion to Oddfellowship, and his life and service as a man and a citizen.

Athena Lodge, at Harrowsmith, through Mr. Babcock, presented a recommendation for the removal of the lodge to Yarker. He intimated that the members of the lodge generally were interested in this change and it was advisable to have the matter voted upon in lodge and followed by an appeal to the grand master on behalf of the grand lodge.

The proposed revival of the sovereign grand lodge of Canada was brought up by R. Meek, of Kingston, who reviewed the circumstances in connection with the origin, life, and premature demise of the former grand lodge of British North America.

The question of degrees and the incompetency of members to receive sick benefits who had not obtained the third degree was discussed very fully by William Patterson, of Kingston, supported by J. Dick, the secretary-treasurer of the district lodge.

DEADLOCK INJURIOUS

To the separate schools of the city.

Trustees Must Reach Understanding—School Debt, \$39,000—St. Mary's School Needs Addition, But There is no Money for it.

There are no further developments in regard to the separate school board trouble over appointment of teachers for St. Mary's school.

One of the trustees who took the name of "progressives," states that if the other side demands a "head" it must be "an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth," he declares.

The trustees who left the meeting on Tuesday evening are in favor of giving publicity to separate school matters, as is done in the case of the public school board.

One of the trustees strongly criticizes the provincial separate school inspector for not insisting upon improvements to the local separate schools.

The present tax rate of both the public and the separate schools is five and twelve one-hundredths mills. As the public school rate increased through demands of the public school board, the rate of the separate schools was equally increased, though not through the initiative of the separate school board.

The debt upon the separate schools, it is learned, is about \$39,000, which is about as large as the law will allow. Unless the tax rate is increased, as some of the trustees have advocated, it cannot be wiped out, nor can improvements be made to the school buildings or increased salaries be paid.
