Washing Dairy Vessels.

All vessels should first be thoroughly rinsed with cold or warm—not hot—water, to remove all traces of milk, and then scalded with boiling water, which destroys the germs.

Pointers for June. Make a seedbed outdoors in June and sow vegetables and flowers for fall and winter use. Put brush on the bed to keep off cats, dogs and chickens. Lay newspapers over the brush and sprinkle carefully every day until the plants are up.
