THE YACHTING EVENTS

TO ARRANGE FOR CRUISING RACES THIS SEASON.

A Fine One Will be Held on Dominion Day—Motor Boats to be in It—Events Arranged.

A meeting of the Kingston Yacht Club regatta committee was held Friday evening, with Col. F. Strange in the chair. The chief business of the meeting was to arrange for a cruising race for motor boats and also one for sailing yachts for prizes offered by Commodore Kent. A report from motor boat owners was presented stating that a large number of them intend to enter in the interesting event. It was decided to start the races on Saturday, July 1st, and the finishing point will be Dominion Lands. No. 1, near Gananoque, a distance of about sixteen and a half miles. The motor boats will go down by the North channel and the sailing yachts on the outside of Howe Island. A handicap will be arranged at the start and whichever boat reaches the destination first will be the winner. Dominion Lands will be the rendezvous for all the boats and it is proposed to erect a large tent there for the benefit of motor boat men who have no sleeping accommodation on their boats. There is a fine bay at this point giving good accommodation for the whole regatta and with a large gathering of the yachtsmen a very pleasant outing is anticipated. The regatta committee will supplement Commodore Kent's prizes with a second and third prize for each class of boats. After the regatta at Dominion Lands the cruise will be continued over the two holidays.

The committee also arranged a schedule of events for the season, opening with a race on the morning of Coronation Day. The programme arranged is as follows:

- June 22—First race for the Bruce Caruthers trophy.
- July 1—Cruising race and regatta to Dominion Lands, No. 1.
- July 8—Second race for Bruce Caruthers trophy.
- July 11—Cruising race to Capo Vincent, to take part in the Eastern Yacht Racing Circuit race.
- July 22—Cruising holiday cruising race of local races.
- Aug. 5—Third Bruce Caruthers trophy race.
- Aug. 28 to Sept. 2—Lake Yacht Racing Association regatta at Toronto.

The sailing yacht fleet will have an important addition this year, as Col. Strange is bringing the speedy Heather of Gananoque, to the city for the season, and will enter her in the different races.

THE CLOSING SESSION

OF THE COUNTY COUNCIL HELD SATURDAY MORNING.

The Court House to be Decorated for Coronation Day—Wolfe Island's Relation to Sydenham High School.

The county council held its closing session on Saturday morning. Caretaker Tenor, of the court house, was appointed to look after the registry office at \$10 a month. The usual grants to the county agricultural societies were made.

On motion of Councillor Stewart, a number of questions were ordered to be submitted to the county solicitor regarding the relation of Wolfe Island to the Sydenham high school. Councillor Stewart wants to know if Wolfe Island can be made to pay its share of the capital expenditure for the new wing, although it is not included in the high school district. Councillor Brisland wants to know if Wolfe Island can get \$75 which the county owes it in relation to extra grants for maintenance of this school. On motion of Councillor Truscott and Councillor Salmon, county treasurer was given an increase of \$100 in salary, for faithful service and additional work. Mr. Purdy has been the means of saving money to Frontenac in the past few years, and the councillors recognized his valuable services.

On motion of Councillors Reid and Salmon, Councillor Truscott was added to the building committee of the Sydenham high school. Councillor Rogers held that seven councillors were too many to be placed on that building committee. Three were sufficient, and he moved in amendment that the committee be reduced to three. The motion of Councillor Reid was carried.

Councillors Salmon and Galdin were appointed to meet a deputation from the Lennox and Addington council to decide upon repairs to Stone Creek bridge. On motion of Councillor Reid, the clerk was directed to have the court house decorated in honor of coronation day.

This recommendation of the property committee was adopted. That the City of St. Catharines purchase for hard wood at \$6.90 a cord, and \$6.75 a cord for hard coal, and \$5 a ton for soft coal, be accepted. The council adjourned to meet in November.

The token of esteem was a locket watch fob of solid gold engraved with the emblem of the Masonic order in raised monogram. Mr. Sproule was taken completely by surprise but recovered sufficiently to make a suitable reply.
