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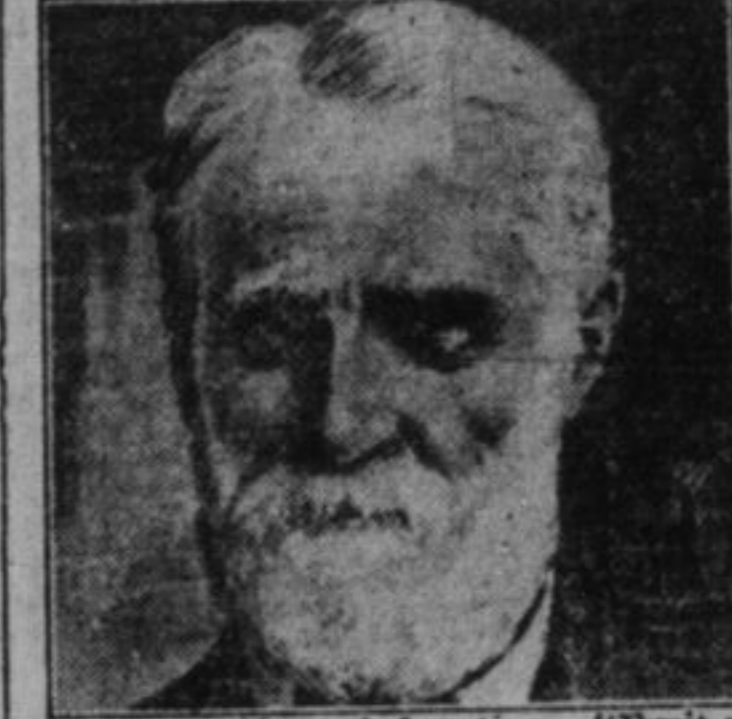

A PASTOR OUSTED

RED STONE PRESBYTERY DROPS DR. PRICE OF McKEESPORT. Despite Pleading of Women of His Congregation the Higher Church Board Asks Him to Find New Field—Says He's Wronged. Pittsburgh, Pa., June 17.—The Rev. Dr. Walter E. Price, pastor of the exclusive McKeesport First Presbyterian church, has been ousted from his charge by orders of the Red Stone presbytery. Dr. Price, who was one of the most prominent ministers in western Pennsylvania, was reported to have had "affinities" among the young society girls of his congregation. He is married and has a family. Following sensational rumors, Dr. Price disappeared from McKeesport. During his absence it was reported that his wife found notes in his pockets, written by prominent young women of the city, in which they begged him not to desert them. A few days ago Dr. Price returned to McKeesport. He said he had been wronged and intended to leave McKeesport with his family. The women of the congregation, however, cried and begged him to stay. His case was taken up by the Red Stone presbytery. A petition signed by the women members of the church begged the presbytery to allow Dr. Price to remain their pastor, but despite their pleading, the preacher was asked to leave.

TO CHURCH IN A BALLOON. Aeronauts Promised to Attend Services—Guided by Spires. The balloon as a means of conveyance to church was utilized by Charles J. Glidden, of Easton, and J. J. Van Valkenburg, of South Framingham, in a journey from Lowell to Topsfield, Mass., twenty miles. The aeronautes ascended at 3:30 a.m., and promised their friends to land near a church and attend Sunday services. After floating before a west wind for an hour and a half, during which several photographs were taken of the rising sun, the aeronautes were noted below. The balloon was brought down and struck ground 300 feet from the Methodist Episcopal church of Topsfield. The aeronautes waited until the hour of service and then joined the congregation.

ARE YOU AN HEIR? Many in Canada and United States Have Money in Chancery. It is estimated that there are something like 20,000 persons scattered throughout Canada and the United States who are entitled to moneys and lands now tied up in the English court of chancery, and elsewhere, owing to the inability of lawyers to locate them. The great trouble is that foreign lawyers, when searching for lost heirs, almost invariably advertise for them in London and Edinburgh newspapers. These papers are seldom seen on this continent, and of course the missing heir never knows of the good fortune that is awaiting him or her, and thus the case drags along in the courts for an indefinite time.

Differences. New York Herald. Mrs. J. G. Phelps-Stokes, (Rose Pastor), the socialist worker, recounted, at a socialist meeting in New York, her amusing experiences among slum children. "Not long ago," she said, "I saw on the street a little boy and girl whose clothes looked as if they had grown upon them. Speaking to them, I urged them to lead me to their mother, who politely informed me that it was her custom, at the beginning of cold weather, to sew the little ones up in flannels, freeing them with the return of spring. I persuaded the mother to put buttons on the clothes and to bathe her children regularly. Then, last week, I visited her again. 'Well, I said, 'how do the winter baths go?' 'The children don't like it, ma'am, said the mother. 'Johnny refused his bath positively yesterday. He said you could do as you liked and he would do as he liked. You like to be cold and clean—he likes to be warm and dirty.'"

Temporary Orthodoxy. London Chronicle. It is not chiefly as sceptic that most of us come to comment on David Hume. But the story of his very temporary orthodoxy is worth recalling. Having fallen into a swamp at the back of Edinburgh castle, he called for assistance to a woman who was passing. At first she took no notice, but presently she asked, 'Are na ye Dumfries, the atheist?' 'Well, no, ma'am, said Hume, 'Christian charity commands you to do good to every one.' 'Christian charity here or Christian charity there,' said the woman, 'I'll do naething for you till ye turn a Christian yourself.'—ye man repeats the Lord's Prayer and the Creed or faith I'll let ye graze (grovel) there as I found ye.' And he had to repeat them.

Worrying Happiness. London Daily Mail. The Bishop of Manchester, speaking at a meeting of Church House, Westminster, said the secret of happiness was to have a sufficient multitude of worries. The man who had only one worry, a blind that would not be pulled up straight by the servant, or a coal scuttle the bottom of which was always coming out, found his way to the lunatic asylum. But the man who had no time to dwell upon his worries because he had to go from one to another, and back again and round and round like a squirrel in a cage, could be a perfectly happy man.

Tax Unmarried or Childless. In Norway an unmarried person having an income of \$2,500 a year must pay an income tax of \$421.22. A married person with one child would have to pay \$389.94, and with six children \$255.17. Married or single persons in Norway can escape an income tax only by having an income of less than \$50.00.

WOMEN GROWING TALLER.

Average Height of Parisiennes is 1-4 Inches More. French women are growing taller at least in Paris. The results of the "careful and minute measurement of 255 Parisiennes, aged from twenty-one to fifty-five years," have been communicated to the Academy of Sciences. Apparently the women chosen were considered to be peculiarly representative, for the averages obtained, even from so small a number of observations, were held to have some general value. It was found that the average height of the Parisian woman had increased by almost one and one-quarter inches than the women of the rest of France, the present average being about five feet one and one-quarter inches.

Sir Ernest Shackleton, who has been stalking the south pole, for which he was knighted, was the guest of honor at a luncheon given by the girls in New York. To separate them Sir Robert quickly carried his family to Nithsdale, but Douglas quickly followed and lured in the vicinity for some months, clandestinely meeting his love among "Maxwellton's bonnie braes." The pair plighted troth, and when Douglas returned to Edinburgh to assist a projected Stuart uprising he took with him the promise which he celebrated in the song, and, he said, the song was published in an Edinburgh paper and attracted much notice. Douglas' devotion to the Jacobites cost him his sweetheart; his political intrigues being suspected, he was forced to flee the country, and when, after some years passed in France, he returned to the United Kingdom, he was the wife of another.
