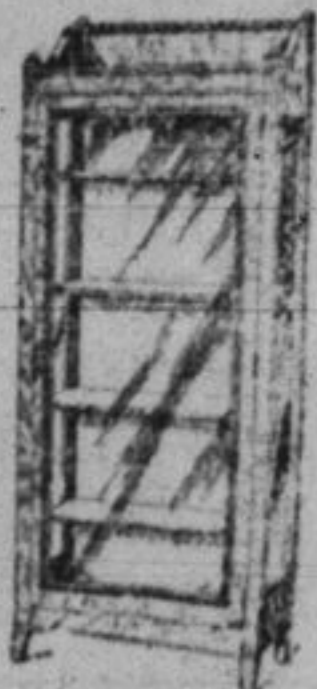

EASY FOR VICTORIAS

DEFEATED ATHLETICS BY ELEVEN RUNS TO ONE.

A Runaway Game in the City League—The Athletics Made Ten Errors—Athletics Beat Orioles 23 to 6.

The Victorias, elusive and steady as ever, coming out of the game a week ago by the margin of one run, and eager to add another scalp to their belt, scored another triumph and immediately gave them a stronger bid for first place after coming out of last Saturday's scrap heap on top and winning from the Athletics by the overwhelming score eleven runs to one.

From the beginning the game was not in the same class as that on the previous day between C.L.C.'s and Vics, not yet that of the week before that in which the Athletics took part. From the start the Athletics seemed to be off color, and with a number of costly errors made it an easy thing for the Vics to walk away with the game.

Athletics lost control of the game and Victorias pressed their opponents in the first innings when four runs were scored off Muekler, who was on the mound for the Athletics. Nicholson, the first man up touched for a hit, stole second and third, and crossed the plate on a sacrifice hit of McMahon. Pound got a hit off Muekler which stood good for a run, and the sacrifice hit of McMahon later turned into a run when Cotman sacrificed. Dick struck to short stop, got his base on an error and scored on an overthrow of Reid from left field. Atwood the always sure hitter, misjudged his ball and struck out to first base. Muekler got the first hit for the Athletics in the second innings after stitches had been unable to see the ball come over the plate three times in succession. Rae got his base on an error of Gillespie, but the next two men were put down—in succession retiring the side before they were able to bring a man across the plate.

Nicholson started scoring in the second innings with a safety hit to third base which was too hot for Rae to handle. Pound's sacrifice to Muekler produced the desired result in advancing Nicholson a base. A nelder's choice from McMahon's bat and muffed by Dunlop was the means of letting Nicholson in. McMahon and Duncan both scored later on a wifty one from Cotman which sailed forth beyond the reach of the outfielders. The Victorias did not score in the third innings, while the Athletics went down in one, two, three fashion. In the fourth Pound shrimped the ball to the size of a marble, as it disappeared in the distance over the fielder's head. He got two bases on it and scored later on a hit of Dunlop. After making a nice hit to third base in the fifth, Dick got home on a two base hit of Davidson. He scored later on a hit of Gillespie. McMahon scored the last run in the sixth innings, after hitting a safety right field stealing second and third and coming home on an error of third baseman.
