A DRUMHEAD SERVICE FLOWER SERVICE HELD

WAS HELD AT BARRIEFIELD CAMP ON SUNDAY. IN SYDENHAM STREET METHODIST CHURCH SUNDAY.

The 14th Regiment Marched Over—Two Volunteers Fainted From the Extreme Heat.

A drum head service, held at Barriefield camp, Sunday morning, was of a very impressive nature and was participated in by the regiments in camp as well as the 14th regiment, E.W.O. rifles, which marched over, leaving the city at 9 a.m. The weather was very warm and two of the volunteers fainted from the heat and were carried out of the ranks.

Service was held at 8.30 for the Roman Catholics in camp and was conducted by Rev. Father Hanley, of St. Mary's cathedral. At 10.30 all the Protestant denominations were tipped together. The singing of the rousing martial hymns was led by the band of the 14th regiment, and the singing was indulged in by the soldiers. Rev. J. W. Jones, chaplain of the 47th regiment, took the responsive readings, and Rev. Mr. Beatty, chaplain of the 49th regiment, read the Tesson.

Rev. Mr. Thompson, chaplain of the 49th regiment, in his address to the soldiers, made a strong appeal to his hearers to be in readiness, taking as his text St. Paul's utterance, "I am ready." He pointed out the different qualities of readiness. Duty was perhaps the first. A true soldier must do his duty. It was the Britisher's exercise of what he considered his duty to his king and his God. Discipline was another important quality of readiness. Unless we had discipline and organization we could never say with Paul, "I am ready." The chaplain closed his discourse with a strong appeal for another quality, perhaps the most important, devotion to Christ.

The service was read from booklets provided by the militia department. A number of civilians went over to the camp and joined in the service.

Flower Sunday in Sydenham Street Methodist church was celebrated, yesterday. The beginners' chorus, by another class, showed the training which they had undergone in as great a degree as the first chorus.

E. P. Jenkins, in a brief address, showed what the missionary society was doing in foreign lands. The money which had been subscribed had been thankfully received, but a great deal more was necessary to carry on the work there. The pastor, Rev. T. W. Neal, spoke for a short time, also dwelling on the welcome he had received, last year, at the flower service, which was the first Sunday he had been in the church.

An exemplification of the Boy Scout's work was given on the platform to give the people an idea of the help and training which these boys receive and which is a great benefit to themselves and to others. Harold and Harvey Angrove sang very delightfully during the service.

The always-new chorus, "The Maple Leaf Forever" was heartily indulged in by the school, after which a Chinese story, illustrated by pictures, in the hands of a class, was given, showing the effects of binding feet in the heathen countries. The secretary-treasurer's report, given by A. F. Chown, was read, and the gathering dismissed by the pastor.

TRAVERS IN TORONTO

TAKEN FROM PENITENTIARY ON SATURDAY AFTERNOON

Looking Somewhat Haggard From His Week's Stay in Prison—Has No Fault to Find in His Treatment at the Penitentiary.

Looking somewhat haggard, from his week's stay in the penitentiary, W. R. Travers, the man who helped to break the Farmers' bank, was taken back to Toronto, on Saturday afternoon, where he is to be held to give evidence in the Lindsay case.

Inspector Gathrie, of Toronto, had the prisoner in charge, and he left on the 3.19 train, which would arrive in Toronto about nine o'clock.

Travers is always used well. Inspector Gathrie went out to the penitentiary for him in a cab, about two o'clock, and from there the two drove to the Randolph hotel, where they had dinner. Afterwards, they drove to the outer station. They had about twenty minutes or so, to wait for the train, and while on the platform many eyes were glancing at the man who has been in the limelight for many weeks.

As already stated in the Whig, Travers' hair was clipped a few days ago, and his mustache taken off, and, as a result, it gave him a rather tough appearance. However, he is in good health, although while waiting for the train he appeared to be quite nervous, and was very anxious to get on the train. He was dressed in a light suit and still hat.

As a penitentiary, Travers thinks that the institution at Portsmouth is O.K., and has warm words for the warden and deputy warden, saying that everything is carried out as it should be. He has no complaint to make. He has had to sweep out corridors and do odd jobs, but he likes it. He says the hardest part is the confinement after the day's work is finished.

Coronation Events in St. Mary's.

Coronation day is to be specially observed in St. Mary's, cathedral, on Thursday. A coronation sermon is to be preached by Rev. Father Naish, S.J., Montreal, at high mass. Father Naish spent twelve years in India as a Roman Catholic chaplain to the British troops. On Friday, he is to preach to the Society of the Sacred Heart, and on Sunday to the children of the Holy Name. On account of next Friday being one of the days of coronation week, the pope has granted dispensation to Roman Catholics to eat meat. Father Naish goes from Kingston to Alexandria to hold a mission for non-Catholics.

Models of Bridges.

The cadets of the Royal Military College have on exhibition in one of the class rooms, models of bridges they have made during their engineering course. These models are decidedly interesting, and give a fine insight into the work done by military engineers in wartime. They will be of interest to many who attend the ball to-night. A museum should be added to the college, so that work of this kind could be retained.

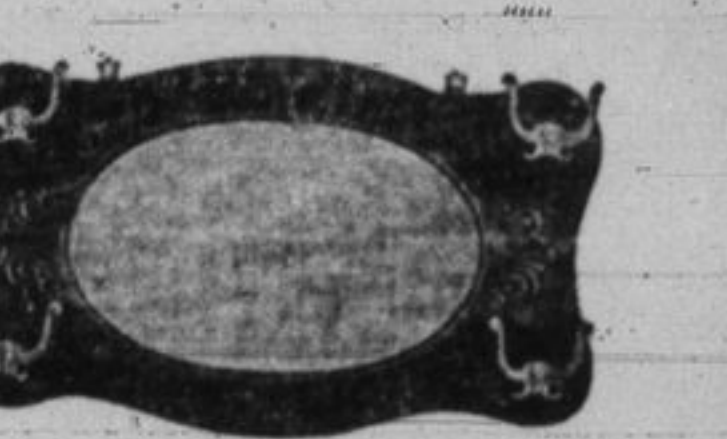
