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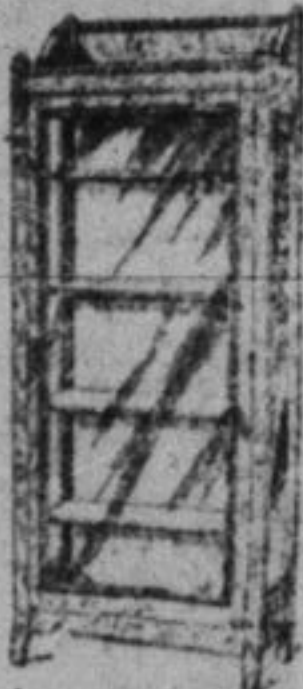

The annual ball, given by the commandant, staff and gentlemen cadets of the Royal Military College of Canada, seems to have attained almost world-wide fame. Since the first of June from far and near visitors have been flocking in to participate in this event and the other gaieties that the closing of the college demands. The June balls of the past have always come up to the highest expectations of the guests, but this year the extensive decorations, the brilliancy of the scene and the magnificent costumes were even more than one could imagine. For the past few days the cadets have successfully assumed the role of carters, electricians, wood cutters, etc., each one doing his best to make the ball of 1911 surpass all previous efforts. The gymnasium, where the dancing was held, was transformed into an ideal ball room, and was gaily decorated with flags and bunting. Shields and trophies of many a sport showed that the boys of the red and white are firm believers in the old adage that "All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy." Frail's orchestra, Toronto, which was stationed at one end of the room, combined with the perfect floor, provided irresistible and even after the programme of twenty-eight dances and four extra, the guests seemed loth to leave. The galleries, which were arranged with rugs, cushions and large comfortable chairs, made an ideal place for those who did not care to dance. The devotees of bridge were not neglected, but were able to arrange many interesting tables and enjoy a quiet game.

Downstairs the fairy scene was complete. Bowers of evergreen on either side with their dimly shaded lights, made enticing sitting-out places, and here between dances, ice cream and claret cup were enjoyed.

In the centre between walls of green glistening black and red were placed, and here the girls were able to put their flowers and at dawn find them as fresh and sweet as ever. June being the month of roses these were the favorite flowers, and choicest blooms were culled for fortunate maidens.
