POLICE AND PICKPOCKETS FIGHT AROUND A COFFIN.

Revolvers and Knives Flash in Jewish Temple After Thieves Rob Mourners at Bier.

New York, June 20.—While half a dozen men were bending over the coffin containing the body of Louis Berlin, preparing it for the funeral service in the Jewish temple at No. 159 East 118th street, yesterday at noon, ten pickpockets swarmed into the temple, in which several hundred mourners were congregated, and robbed various persons of more than a thousand dollars. Policemen were hurriedly summoned, and after a battle captured three men, who are alleged to belong to the band of thieves. Revolvers and knives were used in the fight.
