**A HEART BALM SUPPER**  
 FEAST ACHIEVES RECORD FOR  
 COSTLINESS AND HILARITY.

Programme a Surprise—British  
 Players Dining Victors Become  
 Guests Lat-er in Night in Cafe  
 Beau Arts.

New York, June 29.—Elixir for the  
 eyes also, was the Heart Balm Supper  
 accounted at the Cafe Beau Arts, and  
 tendered about town as one of the  
 most sparklingly costly feasts New  
 York has had in many a year.  
 It was a function which began with  
 the North Star and ended with the  
 sun. Its attractions merged the class-  
 and the modern in "Cupid's Champagne  
 Fountain," and drew upon Broadway  
 for a score of the reigning beauties of  
 its stage.  
 Vizards and vintages, with souvera-  
 of gold and gems, brought the cost of  
 the entertainment to \$600 a plate. As  
 there were sixty persons present the  
 sum of \$36,000 represents the outlay of  
 enthusiastic American hosts. The Ed-  
 gible, vanquished on the polo field, have  
 shown all scores of defeat. Some  
 discomfited as they were in panoply of  
 the evening before stood on board the  
 deck of the Mauretania waving their  
 hands in parting to "Britches" all.  
 The supper was well begun when the  
 theatres were closing. To be well  
 drunk to the better luck of the British  
 next time and the guests filled their  
 gold rimmed glasses to the tune of  
 "Hail Columbia." The hours brightened  
 as they passed and one delight follow-  
 ed another as the programme the two  
 strangers had directed was unfolded in  
 light and tripping steps.

Suddenly the lights went out, there  
 came several seconds of darkness, a  
 whisper or two, a signal, and with  
 the returning electric glow it was seen  
 that at the plate of each young wo-  
 man present was a jewel box contain-  
 ing a costly favor. Exclamations of  
 thanks and appreciation came and then  
 by another quick change were intro-  
 duced novel diversions.  
 Terpsichore and all her nimble train  
 were there, and after the supper the  
 polo players and their friends and the  
 young women danced with the vivacity  
 which gladdens students days in the  
 French capital. Twinkling feet and  
 sparkling wine added to the bright  
 gaieties of that night, and when the  
 closing toasts were offered several of  
 the young men mounted chairs and  
 drank from dainty footed vessels of  
 exquisite design, which were passed  
 from man to man. The sun was peep-  
 ing in at the windows when the Heart  
 Balm Supper was nearing its close.  
 At last swiftly moving automobiles  
 carried the English visitors to the  
 Cunard pier from which the Mau-  
 retania departed.

**QUEEN'S WOMAN'S RESIDENCE.**  
 The Alumnae Association is Active  
 in the Matter.  
 Toronto Globe.

We are informed by a Kingston cor-  
 respondent that a small residence, ac-  
 commodating about twenty, was open-  
 ed about nine years ago by a com-  
 mittee of ladies connected with the  
 university, and that its pronounced  
 success and popularity under the  
 management of the lady dean, Miss  
 Lillian Mowat, long ago convinced the  
 university trustees, as well as the re-  
 sidence committee, that a larger  
 scheme was desirable. So the ladies  
 has the idea become that the women  
 students not in residence last session  
 sent a deputation to the committee  
 asking if something could not be  
 done to extend the benefits of the re-  
 sidence, and offering to contribute to  
 such an object. The result of this was  
 that steps were taken to revive an  
 alumnae association, which had been  
 inactive for many years, and the as-  
 sociation, with Miss A. E. Marty, of  
 the Ottawa Collegiate Institute, as pre-  
 sident, took for its initial object the  
 raising of funds for a women's resi-  
 dence. Mrs. Stewart's proposal to  
 make the residence a memorial to the  
 late Mrs. Gordon is a welcome sug-  
 gestion which will appeal to all who  
 knew Mrs. Gordon. It should be men-  
 tioned that Mrs. Gordon was for sev-  
 eral years vice-president of the com-  
 mittee which managed the residence, and  
 that she gave much thought and time  
 to the plans for securing a larger  
 building. A committee of the alumnae  
 association was appointed in May to  
 make a thorough canvass for subscrip-  
 tions. There are members of this com-  
 mittee in the principal cities of the  
 dominion, and a good beginning has  
 already been made.

**Sunday Refreshments.**  
 Toronto World.  
 Mr. Corley, the crown-attorney, has  
 given an opinion on Justice Middle-  
 ton's judgment as to Sunday sales,  
 confirming the view taken by the  
 World. A restaurant keeper may sell  
 either food or drink or both for con-  
 sumption on the premises, but not to  
 be carried away. This ruling appar-  
 ently covers the case of ice cream,  
 which certainly, from its composition,  
 must be classed as food. The law may  
 at times conflict with common sense,  
 but hardly on this point.

**Oxo at Coronation Processions.**  
 Throughout the line of route which  
 King George's coronation processions  
 will take in London, Eng., on the  
 22nd and 23rd inst. most elaborate  
 arrangements have been made by the  
 St. John's ambulance brigade to deal  
 with all cases of physical exhaustion,  
 and supplies of Oxo and Oxo-  
 colla will be kept ready to hand at  
 all points.
