#### TO GO TO PEOPLE

**The Power Agreement With Seymour Electric Company.**  
Napanee Express.  
On Monday evening last the town council met the representatives of the Seymour Power company, Messrs. Mulholland and Colville, to take up the matter of the proposed sale of the town's electric light plant to the Seymour company, and the agreement as to the rates to be charged for light by the Seymour company. The agreement which is a long one will be published next week in full. The council secured the company's consent to the changes the council proposed in the agreement and the ratemakers will vote on the matter in about a month's time. The exact date will probably be fixed by the council on Monday evening next.

Following are the main points of the agreement:  
The company is to pay the town \$40,666.51 for the plant within thirty days of the passing of a by-law confirming the sale.  
The town is to have the privilege of re-purchasing the plant at the end of any ten years during the life of the agreement.

The company to make extensions of the pole line 220 feet for any customer or up to 400 feet on the order of the town council.  
Should any additional poles be required on Dundas street between Adelphi and West streets, such poles are to be of iron or cement, all poles must be placed, erected, painted and kept in a condition satisfactory to the council.

The company must inspect the lines at least twice each week, so that any defects or repairs may be promptly made.  
The company shall use all safety appliances adopted by the best electrical practices, and any improvement shall be made known to the council and adopted by the company if required by the council.

Should the company fail to give satisfactory service for three months the corporation may cancel the agreement and collect damages from the company.  
The company agrees to furnish 1,000 horse power for use in the town should the council wish to supply same to any power users at \$25 per horse power for twenty-four hours service or \$12 per horse power per annum of connected load plus a meter rate of one cent per horse power hour.  
Current is to be supplied twenty-four hours each day.

The rates agreed to are all the same as published by us last week.  
The company will give a bond for \$5,000 for the due performance of the agreement.  
The company agrees to maintain the present power house in condition for immediate use at any time.

#### MADERO DENTES RUMOR

**That Mexico is to Return to Free Coinage of Silver.**  
Mexico City, June 20.—Francisco I. Madero, Jr., is back in the capital today, after his five day trip through Southern Mexico. Madero will remain at home for a fortnight before making a trip to Pueblo and other parts of Mexico.  
Notwithstanding the losses incurred by the national railways of Mexico during the revolution, a dividend of four per cent, on preferred stock will be paid as usual, according to an announcement by Ernesto Madero, the new minister of finance.

Regarding the depreciation of Mexican bonds on foreign markets, Mr. Madero declared quotations had been lowered but little. He expressed the opinion that they would speedily resume their position in the list. The story that the government intends to return to the free coinage of silver, he emphatically denied.

#### HELPED TO CELEBRATE

**Battle of Bunker Hill at Charlestown, Mass.**  
Charlestown, Mass., June 19.—Under the shadow of the plain shaft that marks the site of the rail fence redoubts where colonial farmers met the British regulars in the first great battle of the revolutionary war, Canadian soldiers in British uniform, on Saturday, joined with Boston in celebrating the 136th anniversary of the battle of Bunker Hill.  
The chief event of the day was a three division military, naval and civil parade in the afternoon. The 82nd Regiment Fusiliers of St. John, N.B., participated in this parade.

#### BEAT HIS WIFE TO DEATH.

**Then Jumped Out of a Window to the Street.**  
New York, June 19.—Louis Kickermeister, beat his wife over the head with an axe to death, then jumped from a window of the flat, four stories to the ground. He fractured his skull and probably will die. Three little children of the pair witnessed the tragedy.

**Hong Kong Mourns Benefactor.**  
Hong Kong, June 19.—Hong Kong mourns the death of its greatest benefactor in the person of Sir Horatio Nelson, a donor of the university which is now building. He was seventy-three years of age.

#### Five Years for Theft.

Woodstock, June 19.—James Verinden and Vincent McNeill, two youths, who stole three horses and two calves from the station, and later broke jail, were given five years each in penitentiary, on two charges, to run concurrently.

#### Seamen May Win.

London, Eng., June 19.—The seamen's strike situation has grown more serious and it looks as though the sailors will win the increased wages at least. A number of ship owners yielded to-day, and office clerks are trying to fill in but making a bad job.
