## CORONATION SERVICES

WERE HELD IN THREE CHURCHES ON THURSDAY.

Many Attended Worship in St. George's and St. Mary's Cathedrals and St. Andrew's Church.

In spite of the inclement weather there was a fairly good attendance, at the service held in St. Andrew's church on Thursday morning, at eleven o'clock, the service taking the form of a special service, in honor of Coronation day.

An appropriate sermon was preached by Rev. Dr. Mackie, and Rev. J. R. Macgillivray and Rev. Dr. MacTavish assisted in the service.

The choir gallery was decorated with flags, and flowers decorated the pulpit and choir railing. A special programme was rendered by the choir and a solo was rendered in fine voice by Arthur Craig. At the close the national anthem was sung by the entire audience.

And he brought forth the king's son, and put the crown upon him, and gave him the testimony; and they made him king, and anointed him, and they clapped their hands and said, "God Save the King."

These words, taken from II Kings, xi-12, formed the basis for the sermon delivered by Rev. Dr. Mackie, who has listened to throughout his learned discourse, with intense interest. He referred to the solemn ceremony which was this day being enacted at Westminster Abbey, and the great responsibilities which rested upon the king.

After pointing out the duty of the king to his people, Dr. Mackie referred to the duty of the people towards their king. Everyone must be loyal to the king, and endeavor as far as possible, to strengthen his hand. We

must recognize his rights, and show obedience to the laws of the land. "The national anthem should be the prayer of the entire British empire," said the preacher, in closing his eloquent discourse.

At St. Mary's Cathedral. It was before a large congregation that the holy sacrifice of the mass was offered up by Rev. A. J. Hanley, Thursday morning in St. Mary's cathedral to ask God's blessing upon King and Queen and Royal Family. He was assisted by Rev. Fr. McDonald and Magher, as deacon and subdeacon. As was or fittingly remarked by Rev. Fr. Mac on last Sunday. Catholics have a special reason to show their gratitude on this occasion the objectionable parts in the "declaration" having been eliminated.

Rev. Fr. Naish, S.J., of Montreal was the orator of the day. The eminent Jesuit paid an eloquent tribute to the young sovereign, whose coronation marks the opening of an epoch full of promise, not only for the British empire, but the entire world.

A mixed choir of the sanctuary boys and men rendered appropriate music, the solo parts in the mass being taken by C. T. Cross. At the offertory, the "Domine salvemur" was sung by the boys, under Rev. Fr. Halligan. At the close of the service and after a solemn "Te Deum" had been chanted, the choir took up "God Save the King," and, in ringing voices, prayed for the protection and preservation of the youthful monarch, whose tact has made him a worthy successor of his august father. "O Canada, terra de nos aieux" was then brightly interpreted on the organ by Prof. Deays.

The palace grounds were also bright with bunting the papal color bearing the tiara and other emblems showing prominently 'midst the sundry standards and tasty decorations.

In St. George's Cathedral. A union service of all the Anglican churches of the city was held in St. George's cathedral, Thursday morning at ten o'clock in honor of the coronation. A procession of the officiating clergymen and members of the choir left the synod hall and proceeded to the cathedral. A large choir was present, consisting of members of St. George's, St. James', St. Luke's and part of Chalmers Presbyterian.

Two fine anthems were rendered with much feeling and devotion, "I Was Glad When They Said Unto Me" and "Zadoc, the Priest." Dean Bidwell sang "The Litaney," and other parts of the service were taken by clergymen of the other churches. The dean preached a sermon, strong, short and to the point. Communion was celebrated by the dean, assisted by Canon Starr.

The decorations of the high altar and the altar in the Lady chapel were lavish and beautiful. All the officers of the permanent corps and staff attended in uniform.
