He Says There is a Danger of Attracting Too Many British Emigrants to Canada—Should Not Overstrain Old Land.

According to so good an authority as Hon. John Burns there is a danger lest the rush of emigrants to Canada and other British dominions should over-drain the supply of humanity in the British Isles.
