## NO SETTLEMENT YET

## IN THE STRIKE OF THE KINGSTON MASONs.

## THE WHIG'S JUMBLE.

## A Lot of News of Interest to Every-body.

Masons Unable to Secure Conference With Contractors—Strikers Accused of Intimidating—Contractor Issues Warning.

The strike of the masons is still on, and from all appearances, there is no sign of a settlement.

The masons, as stated in the Whig, on Tuesday, are anxious to have a settlement, having written to the E. R. Beckwith, noting that the contractors most striking committee and make settlement, but thus far this meeting has not been held. The masons state that a letter was written to E. R. Beckwith asking that such a conference be held, but that Mr. Beckwith, who formerly acted, now refuses to be the medium of communication between the masons and the contractors. The masons have handed the Whig, for publication a copy of the letter sent to Mr. Beckwith. It reads as follows:

"Kingston, June 27th, 1911. Mr. E. R. Beckwith, Dear Sir—I am instructed to inform you that the committee appointed by this union are prepared at any time to meet the contractors and, try, if possible to adjust the differences now existing between that body and this union that the same good feeling which has existed in the past may be restored. An early reply with date and time for such conference will greatly oblige yours truly, ALEX. FOWLER, Cor. Sec. No. 19."

Work is still progressing on the Nicol building, but at the other jobs, there are no masons at work. William McCartney, the contractor on the Nicol building, claims that some of the striking masons have been interviewing his men, in an endeavor to get them off the job, and let states that he will prosecute any of the men who can be caught endeavoring to intimidate the men. Mr. McCartney had a notice placed in the Whig to-day, in regard to the matter.

The stated object is to secure if possible a larger share of the export trade, and to do away with overlapping of orders. Six companies are interested, situated in Chatham, Blenheim, St. Mary's, Stratford, the John Campbell Milling Co. with two mills, at St. Thomas, and the Goldie Milling Co. of this city.
