HAS ADVISED HIS SON NOT TO SUBMIT TO THE VACCINATION ORDER

In the Province of Quebec — A Kingston Citizen Glad That There is a Spirit of Freedom in That Province.

Kingston, June 28.—(To the Editor): I see that the provincial board of health for Quebec province is going to prosecute the municipalities in that province for failing to enforce compulsory vaccination, according to the board's orders. I am a little surprised that the municipalities have not yet, at least a great number of them, complied with the board's regulations, but it only goes to show that even in what is sometimes called benighted Quebec, there is a spirit of freedom, and some enlightenment on the question of vaccination.

I have a son working at Montreal, so I am interested in the compulsory vaccination law there. I have advised him not to comply with the order to be vaccinated, and if he is fined I will pay his fine. I brought him through two pretty strenuous compulsory vaccination "bluffs" here, and if he is a son of his father's, he will not bow to any such tyranny.

Compulsory vaccination laws should be repealed at once. They do not belong to the age in which we live. They were made about the middle of the last century, and are worse than conscription which is long since abandoned. They are on a par with hanging by witchcraft.

There has never been a fine nor an imprisonment in Canada for not complying with compulsory vaccination. All compulsion has been by coercion on the part of the authorities, which is a contemptible way to enforce a law. There is no doubt that vaccination, as practised in this country, is illegal. The seed virus of the vaccine used is human small-pox.

I would like to see some one in Ontario prosecuted for refusing to be smallpoxed, to test the legality of the question. I will venture to say you could not find a jury of twelve good men and true, if the case was allowed to be presented to them fairly, who would convict the defendant. There is no fear of the health authorities in this province allowing the question to come before a jury. They know too well the weakness of their case.

The Whig remembers what a time they had here in Kingston, a few years ago, in trying to get some one on whom to place the responsibility of enforcing their order, and how ignominiously they failed to carry out the "proclamation" posted on the fences and walls of our town. When our darling "Dan" shook his fist in their faces, the city fathers took the nasty looking thing off the fences and buried it, I hope for ever, but not before it buried some of our citizens and will bury more as the years roll on.

The politicians, too, got a lesson they will not soon forget. They remember the majority the voters gave the man who stood up for the freedom of the people. And again, they got a "hunch" in the election of the present mayor, who was the only other man among the city fathers who, from the first, stood up against compulsion. I am not saying these men were elected solely on this question, but it had a big influence which I know for a fact.

I have come to the conclusion, if we wish to rid our statute books of this out-of-date and unnecessary, if not useless law, we shall have to take the question of compulsion into politics. Get it before the people. It is a public question and one the people should decide. I am convinced that the man who makes it an issue will have the vast majority of the voters with him. Let the anti-compulsionists be up and doing.

"NORWAY SOLVES PROBLEM."

Maids Can Only Change Positions Twice Yearly.

In Norway they appear to have solved the servant problem to the satisfaction of both mistress and maid. In such places as Bergen, Christiania, and other large cities, the municipal government takes entire charge of the matter. There is a central employment bureau under municipal control, and twice a year—once in summer and once in winter—disappointed servants can look out for new masters, and mistresses, and dissatisfied employers can seek to improve their service. The bureau is open for one week, and the mistress who wants a maid can go to it, fill in a form stating her requirements and the wages she is willing to pay, and then leave all the rest to the bureau.

Her card is placed on file and the position she offers is posted in a conspicuous place on a blackboard. Men and women servants in want of work examine these cards, and when they decide upon applying for any position, they submit their recommendations to the bureau for examination. If these are satisfactory, the applicant receives a card to the prospective employer, available for one day only.

Should the lady hire the servant, she fills up the card with a list of duties, wages, and terms of service, agreed upon, and returns it to the bureau, where it is carefully filed for future reference if necessary. If the applicant does not suit, the card is returned with "not satisfactory," which indicates that other applicants may be sent.

FISK HANGED AT CALGARY.
 Went to Gallows—Protesting His Innocence.
 Calgary, Alta., June 28.—Protesting his innocence at the last, John Fisk was hanged at the Mounted Police Barracks, here, yesterday morning, for the murder of Tucker Peach, a rancher of Okotoks, May 18th, 1910.
 T. M. Robertson, whose confession implicated Fisk, will be hanged on July 20th.

The murder was traced by some cotton batting in the head of the victim, which was found in the Bow river. Fisk came here from Bruce county, Ont.
WHY FALLON IS CHOSEN.
 Experience as Educator Desirable in Toronto Diocese.
 London, Ont., June 28.—The belief is general here that Bishop Fallon, of London, will succeed the late Archbishop McEvay as head of the diocese of Toronto.
 The main reason advanced is that the completion of the great St. Augustine seminary will call for the supervision and administration of a man thoroughly in touch with educational work. This is the particularly strong point about Bishop Fallon, who, not only in Ottawa, but in Buffalo, made his name by educational work.

STEEL TRUST DOMINATES
 Many Things—What the Commission Will Report.
 Washington, June 28.—It is predicted, to-day, that the report of the special congressional committee investigating the United States Steel Corporation, will report that the trust controls seventy-five per cent. of available unmined ore, does sixty per cent. of all the steel business, manufactures seventy per cent. of rails, ninety per cent. tubes, eighty per cent. sheet iron and tin plate, dominates the coke and cement business, and dominates many railroads and steamboat lines.

The Thieves Caught.
 London, June 28.—Lieuts. Armour and McCarthy, of the Canadian coronation contingent, to-day, prosecuted two sergeants of the regular detachment for stealing their jewellery during their absence, on Coronation day. The prisoners were sentenced to two months' imprisonment. Several officers were robbed at the same time.

Tree Cuts House in Two.
 Bridgeport, Conn., June 29.—While the family of William Crates were about to retire they were startled by a sudden deafening crash as a massive tree fell from an adjoining yard. The tree dropped on the Crates' dwelling in such a way that it cut the house in two, making a clean path through the garret and two bedrooms. The huge trunk cannot be removed without practically tearing the house down.
