Belleville, June 30.—One of the best known surveyors of Hastings county died, Monday morning, in the person of C. F. Aylesworth, D.L.S. For many years he was clerk of the county, and was one of the best posted men on municipal law in Canada; also one of the leading land surveyors in the dominion.

**STRIKERS ARE TRYING TO TIE UP ALL THE SEAPORTS POSSIBLE.**

Tramp Steamers Will Give No Concessions—The White Star Line Has Declared a Lock-Out.

London, June 30.—The shipping federation controls ninety per cent. of the coasting trade, and tramp steamers, and are determined to make no concessions to the striking seamen and dock hands. The strikers have redoubled their efforts to tie up all ports. Railway men refuse to handle cargoes brought in by non-union seamen.

**Situation Unchanged.**

Liverpool, June 30.—The seamen's strike situation showed no improvement to-day. Dock hands now demand a guarantee that the increase will not be merely temporary. The White Star line today declared a lock-out, and is trying to get non-union crews.

**FORMED NEW CHURCH.**

Has Been Officially Recognized by Baptist Association.

Frockville, June 30.—Owing to a split in the congregation of the First Baptist church some months ago, the majority of the members and adherents withdrew and formed a new church, under the pastorate of Rev. S. J. Robins, who went out with them. A council composed of lay and clerical representatives of the twenty-two churches forming the Central Canada Baptist Association have just concluded a meeting here, at which the new church was officially recognized and extended the hand of fellowship. Officers have been elected and a name will be decided upon at a congregational meeting to be held later. Preparations are being made for the building of a edifice.

**L.O.L. Has New Grand Master.**

Winnipeg, Man., June 30.—Dr. Sproule, M.P., for ten years grand master of the Supreme Orange Lodge, insisted on retiring, much against the will of the delegates. Lieut. Col. J. H. Scott, Walkerton, Ont., deputy grand master, was elected in his place.

**400 CONVERSIONS IN COURSE OF TWO YEARS**

Archbishop Bruchesi Says Protestant Population of Montreal is Turning to the Roman Faith.

Montreal, June 30.—His grace the Roman Catholic archbishop of Montreal, in authority for the statement that more than 400 persons abandoned allegiance to Protestant denominations in this city during the past two years and made common cause with the adherents of the Church of Rome. This, in fact, is what Mgr. Bruchesi reported to have told a representative of La Croix newspaper in the French capital while en route for Madrid, where the eucharistic congress is drawing to a close.

**ELECTED GRAND MASTER.**

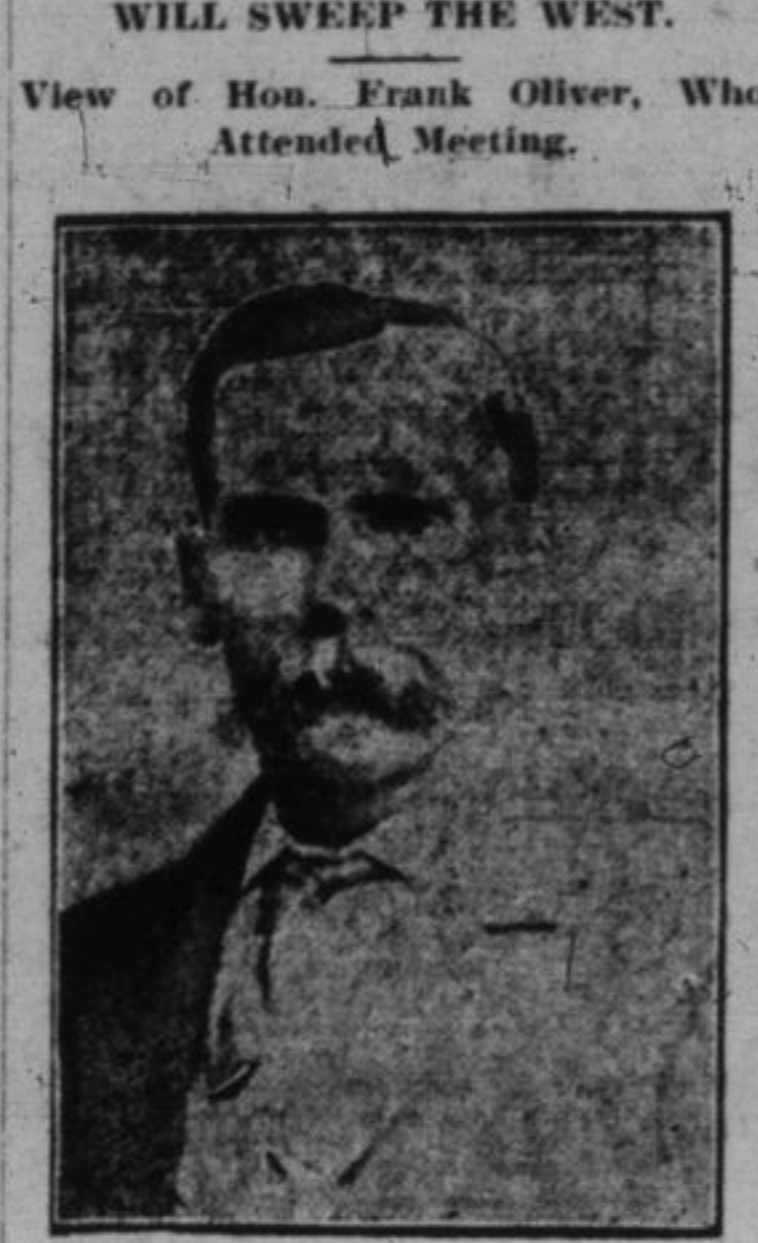
Col. J. H. Scott, Walkerville Chosen By Orange Grand Lodge.

Winnipeg, June 30.—The political platform, drawn up by the Orange grand lodge, this morning, includes federal marriage law, a law making it a criminal offence to use influence to separate legally married people, complete provincial autonomy in educational matters, elimination of all special privileges to any race or religion, except those of the British North America act and opposition to any added privileges, maintenance of British connection, and special encouragement to British immigrants.

Col. J. H. Scott, Walkerville, was elected grand master; Dr. Ellis, Fleming, Sask., deputy, and Rev. H. A. Fish, Owen Sound, grand chaplain.

Edmonton, June 30.—Hon. Frank Oliver, an interested auditor at Mr. Borden's Edmonton meeting, stated that after touring Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, and holding political meetings at most of the important centres, he was more convinced than ever that on the reciprocity issue the government would greatly increase its support in all three provinces. He has found absolutely no defections from the liberal ranks, while on the other hand in every riding scores of electors who, in 1908, voted conservative, have openly announced their intention of supporting the government's proposals at the polls when the opportunity comes.

Mr. Oliver will hold a number of further meetings before returning to Ottawa, on July 18th.

**Italian Was Sent Back.**

An Italian, who arrived in Kingston, on the boat from Cape Vincent, on Thursday afternoon, did not have a very long stay in Kingston, and his stay, brief as it was, was not of a very pleasant nature, for the reason that he spent part of the time in the police station. He was regarded as an undesirable and in order to keep an eye on him the immigration authorities had him kept at the police station over night, and he was sent to the Cape on the five o'clock boat Friday morning.

**Does Not Represent Republicans.**

Washington, June 30.—Senator Britton, of Kansas, insurgent republican, declares that President Taft does not represent the majority of the republican party on the reciprocity bill. "He does not represent the majority of the republicans in the House of Senate," he said, "and I do not believe he represents a majority of the republicans of the country."

**Funeral of Geo. Lalley.**

The funeral of little George Lalley, the lad drowned a week ago, took place, Friday morning, from the undertaking parlors of S. S. Corbett, at Cataragui cemetery. Service was conducted by Canon Starr. The parents wish to thank all those who by their kindly assistance helped to make the hours of the little fellow's death as light as is possible and also assisted in the search for him.

**Strikers Arrested in Toronto.**

Toronto, June 30.—Nine strikers were picked up in front of Gordon Mackay's garment factory, Front street, who were arrested, this morning, in police court were remanded for a week. Bail was given each of one hundred dollars. They are charged with disorderly conduct.

**A Bomb Was Exploded.**

Madrid, June 30.—It is officially confirmed, to-day, that during the Eucharistic procession, yesterday, a bomb was exploded in a side street. No one was injured.

WOMAN SCARED DUMB AS MAN LOOTS HOUSE.

Too Frightened to Cry Out, Mrs. Remshard, of Bellevue, N.J., Watches Burglar Take Ham and Cheese From Ice Box.

Bellevue, N.J., June 30.—Too frightened to make an outcry, Mrs. William Remshard, of Colonial Terrace, allowed a burglar to ransack the house, early yesterday, even to placing his hand under the pillow of the bed where she lay. As a result of her experience Mrs. Remshard is suffering from a severe attack of nervous prostration and is under the care of a physician.

**ARCHBISHOP O'CONNOR DEAD.**

Prelate Passed Away in Toronto on Friday Morning.

Toronto, June 30.—Archbishop O'Connor passed away at the basilian novitiate this morning. He retired from active duty in 1908, and had been in ill health since last Whitsunday. Against the doctor's advice he continued one hundred children in St. Michael's cathedral. The strain was too great and he has not since been able to leave his bed. He was seventy years of age, and was born in Pickering township. He was made Bishop of London in 1900, and archbishop of Toronto in 1909.

**ELEVEN CRUSHED TO DEATH**

In Collapse of Pumping Station at Buffalo, N.Y.

Buffalo, N.Y., June 30.—Seven workmen were crushed to death and seven others were seriously injured, this morning, when the roof and part of the wall of the new water works pumping station collapsed. The dead, who were working in the pit of the pump house, were buried under hundreds of tons of steel, brick and mortar. The cause of the collapse is unknown.

**STEAMERS HAVE DECIDEDLY ANXIOUS TIME**

Immense Waterspouts Threaten Vessels and Her Disabled Consort.

Melbourne, Australia, June 30.—The steamer Pilbarra, of the Australasian-United Steam Navigation company, arrived at Fremantle, yesterday in tow of the steamer Kurnalpi, having had a thrilling experience in mid-ocean.

Pilbarra was disabled shortly after leaving Geraldston, but her plight was opportunely seen by the Kurnalpi and arrangements made for towing her. With difficulty a hawser was passed aboard in the high wind and terrific seas that prevailed.

The vessels made fast and started for the nearest port. As they were proceeding slowly, five waterspouts suddenly appeared a short distance away and whirling near, threatened to overwhelm both steamers. Great apprehension was felt on board, but by a fortunate chance the waterspouts which were of huge size, changed their direction and passing close to the laboring craft left them unharmed.
