Vanishing Kaskaskia.

A hundred and fifty years ago Kasaskia, Ill., was the largest town west of the Alleghenies. Founded in 1682 by La Salle, or as some say, by the Chevalier de Tonty four years later, Kasaskia became the first capital of Illinois. To-day a single smoke-house is all that remains of the historic old French town, and in a few weeks it will probably disappear beneath the yellow waters of the Mississippi river, which has swallowed up the rest of the town, and Kasaskia will finally disappear. The Mississippi is a bad neighbor and obliterated vestiges of the past as ruthlessly as the River Nile itself.—New York World.
