## STRIKE IS SETTLED BAPTIST UNION PICNIC THE SPORT REVIEW

### STRIKE IS SETTLED

Strikers and Contractors Had Conference at City Hall Friday Night—New Agreement Has Been Drawn Up Satisfactory to Both Parties.

The strike of the Kingston masons has been settled. The men who have been out, will return to work, on Tuesday morning, and as far as can be learned everything is agreeable to both the masons and the contractors. A settlement was reached at a conference of the masons and the bosses in the city hall, on Friday night. The meeting was well attended, every contractor in the city, with the exception of one, who was called out of the city, and could not attend, being present.

Everything has been settled satisfactorily," remarked Thomas Lizard, when asked by the Whig, Saturday morning, about the conference. "We have a new agreement, copies of which I am having printed, to-day. Both parties are satisfied with the agreement."

Mr. Lizard stated further that the new agreement would cover up till the year 1913. By the terms of the agreement, the stone cutters will cut the rough stone about which there has been so much trouble. The new agreement is a new one entirely.

The conference lasted until nearly midnight, and it is stated that labor matters were given a great discussion. The strike money arrived in the city on Friday afternoon and has been distributed among the men.

The announcement that the strike had been settled was received as good news by citizens in general, and especially by those who are having buildings erected.

All the jobs which have been held up will now be proceeded with, and everything will be O.K.

### UNION NOT YET DISCUSSED

#### Between the Two Church Bodies in Portsmouth.

There have been reports regarding a union between the Methodist and Presbyterian churches in Portsmouth. A Methodist minister stated to the Whig on Saturday that so far there had been no meeting called for the purpose of endeavoring to combine the churches in one. A committee from each church has to be appointed and the two confer on the matter. The matter has then to be taken up by the ruling bodies of both churches, before anything can be done. Such a step has not been taken as yet, as the respective committees have not come together. Furthermore, the clergymen stated that it was not the purpose of the Methodists of Portsmouth to unite with the Presbyterians, for the Methodists had been established there since 1867. The Methodists are the possessors of a church while the Presbyterians meet in a hall. A meeting of the Methodists is to be held on Monday evening for the discussing of Methodist matters exclusively.

### BOAT WAS HELD UP

#### And Owner Has Registered a Complaint.

On Saturday morning, the inspectors held up a boat which was being used for carrying people from Wolfe Island to Kingston, holding that it did not come up to requirements, and as a result one of the interested parties, Grant Grimshaw, is registering a complaint. The vessel brought over a cargo, but was refused permission to go back to the island. Mr. Grimshaw claims that the vessel is fit in every respect, to carry cargo, and as he is not charging a fee, he claims that the inspectors have no right to hold up the vessel. The steamer Missisquoi was finally secured to make a couple of trips to the island before three o'clock.

### LITTLE GIRL DISAPPEARED.

#### Was Located After a Thirty-hour Search.

Leaving a note telling her mother that she would not be back, a little girl, aged thirteen, living on Union street, left her home, and was not located for thirty hours. J. C. McConchie, the agent for the Children's Aid Society, was asked to find her, and with some assistance he located the missing girl at a home in Portsmouth, where she was given shelter, and was afterwards returned to her home in safety. It is stated that the girl ran away from home, because she was afraid of being chastised for some misconduct.
