

AN INTERESTING STORY ABOUT DR. GRENFELL.

Touch of Romance in His Marriage, Which Took Place Two Years Ago -Work Carried on in His Labra-

Spring to the average Canadian heans a multiplicity of recreations, We have worked hard all winter and welcome the change. We give too little thought to the men who have worked not only hard, but heroically in places much colder than this of the Mounted Policeman perishing on duty in the far Northwest, of Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell going his perilous rounds as medical missionary in the equally rigorous Northeast.

Dr. Grenfell, who received an honorary degree at Toronto University recently, has been described as preacher, teacher, physician, surgeon, navigator, pilot, enarity commissioner, orphans' guardian, wreck investigator, salvager of stranded craft, and perambulating Providence to every man. woman and child on the desolate Labrador coast. And at this moment he and all the people he befriends are preparing to throw up their hats in celebration of the break-up of the ice-

tields there. A story which Dr. Grenfell once told in Toronto will give an idea of the variety and non-sectarian character of his work. One day he was called to a distant settlement to see a Roman Catholic woman who had met with an accident. He found is necessary to amputate one of her legs, and she begged him to get her a wooden one, for crippled folk are not among the fittest who survive on that rough coast. Presently he heard of the death of man who had used two wooden legs. He was a Methodist, and he had expressed a wish that the legs should be turned over to the Deep Sea Mission. So it happened that Dr. Grenfell, who is an Episcopalian, fitted a Methodist leg on a Roman Catholic woman, and the experiment worked very satisfactorily.

Dr. Grenfell's marriage two years ago was a romance indeed. He was returning from London-which he can visit without any regrets that he is what he is instead of what he might have been-a fashionable London surgeon. On shipboard he saw a girl who fascinated him. He had never thought much about women before. But he went to a friend who was a passenger and said: "I am going to try to marry that girl." He didn't know her name or anything about her. The friend was astonished, but the doctor was as good as his word. The engagement was made on the ship. and it turned out that the girl was Miss Clanahan, daughter of a wealthy Chicago man. She gave up home and the attractions of a big city, and went gladly with Dr. Grenfell to his lonely Labrador home. Now there is a Wilfred Grenfell, ir.

Fix Alaska Boundary Line.

On behalf of the Dominion Government F. H. Mackie, of the Interior Department, will shortly start work on the survey of the Alaska boundary line from the head of Portland Canal to the open sea. The task is an unusually important one, requiring very careful calculations, and will probably occupy three seasons in its ac-

Mr. Mackie is one of the most expert members of the technical staff of W. F. King, chief astronomer of the Dominion. He has been engaged in Alaska-boundary work for years, and has had charge of parties. Last scason he was engaged in a region of snowcaps and glaciers about forty miles inland from the head of Portland Canal, where the southern land boundary starts at Eagle Point, a few miles from Stewart, B.C.

From Eagle Point, according to the terms of the treaty, the imaginary boundary line runs due east to the centre of the canal and thence turns south to the sea following the centre of the canal. Ordinary methods of triangulation will be adopted in carrying out this work.

At the entrance of the canal the boundary line swings due west, terminating directly south of Cape Muyon at the south end of Prince of Wales Island, Alaska,

According to the Canadian contention this will make Dixon Island and the Queen Charlotte Islands territorial waters of Canada, ensuring exclusively to Canadians the right to fish on the greatest halibut banks in existence.

BEST MEN ARE KILLED.

J. A. Macdonald Tells Plain Facts About War.

"The great twilight zone of modern ivilization is the international area, and there should be such a meeting of national minds as would make lawlessness between two nations as difidult and represensive as crime against a state. The international area must be civilized." That is the yigorous statement

made by Dr. James A. Macdonald, of Toronto, Canada, editor of The Globe, director in the World Peace Foundation established by Edward Ginn, of Boston, and it was uttered during a discussion of the proposed arbitration treaty between the United States. Great Britain and France. Dr. Mace donald thinks the submission of the month marks the 100th anniversary of the outbreak of the war of 1812. Two years hence the centennial of peace between the two countries will be celebrated.

"Do you think so long a period of international amity would have been possible," continued Dr. Macdonald, "had the 4,000 miles of Canadian frontier bristled with fortifications and the Great Lakes been patrolled with battleships of the two nations?

"The burden of armaments caused by the old uncivilized method of settling differences between nations has become simply intolerable. This waste of revenue is one of the greatest obstacles in the way of large social reforms. There is necessarily a limitation in the amount of money that can be applied to internal improvements when a nation like Great Britain spends \$350,000,000 a year on her war budget. "The warfare against ignorance

and crime, and to advance the cause of civilization, and enlightenment and human welfare, requires as much courage and self-sacrifice as are need. ed on the battlefield. Canada cannot afford the cost of war. I do not mean so much the money cost as the cost in men. We need all the brain and brawn, the courage and patriotism of our people for the fields and shops and to carry on the work of government. "The same qualities of unselfish-

ness and sacrifice that are drawn out and stimulated by war are needed in the fight against the foes of honest commercial and industrial life, the great organized and leagued forces of This is the place to have your greed. The very term 'captain of Auto repainted to stand all kinds of industry is taken from the military lexicon, and perhaps unconsciously reveals the belief that many of our greatest corporations are organized to defeat the interests of the people and to prevail at the expense of our pub-

lic welfare. "One of the things that has haunted me, especially since I was in England last, is the reaction of war on the life of the people. What was true of Rome under the Caesars and of-France following the Napoleonic wars is true to-day. The standard of the nation's manhood has suffered. In Scotland I found it had been necessary to lower the physical requirements three times within the last century to secure men to complete the regiments.

"In war, the law of evolution-the survival of the fittest-works inversely. It is the fittest who are sacrificed and who do not survive. The unjust land laws of Great Britain sent many of her most ambitious sons over the seas and formed one of the big factors in the social degeneration of the country. A more important factor, however, was the loss of capable and virile men slain on the field of

Model Farms Far North.

Mr. Bell will be stationed at Fort Smith, which lies on the line of the northern boundary of the Province of Alberta, while Mr. Card's lot will be cast in Fort Simpson, on the Mackenzie, at one time the headquarters of the Hudson Bay Co. for the whole north country.

These points were chosen as the best adapted for the location of farms for the demonstration of the agricultural possibilities of Canada's hinterland, and at the same time to hold up to the northern Indians the manner of life lived by men in civilized communities.
