SPIRITUAL DYNAMITE

IS WHAT IS NEEDED IN THE CHURCHES TO-DAY.

Rev. F. G. Robinson Talks Plainly to the People of Princess Street Methodist Church—The Churches Are Asleep, He Declared.

Although the weather was oppressively warm a good audience gathered in Princess Street Methodist church, Sunday evening, to listen to Rev. Frederick G. Robinson deliver his initial discourse to the congregation. The congregation was impressed at once with the speaker's earnest and convincing manner and his fearlessness in proclaiming the gospel. He spoke from Acts 1, 8: "Ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost will come upon you." He prefaced his remarks by a scathing criticism of the condition of things in the churches to-day.

"The greatest need in the world to-day is the gospel, and that preached fearlessly," exclaimed the speaker at the outset of his sermon. "The world is full of wickedness. We see it on every hand. On every hand we see men and women who are in need of the gospel. Churches are on the right hand and on the left, yet nothing seems to be done to help men and women to live better lives. The Bible says that the time will come when every knee shall bow, and every tongue confess the Lord Jesus Christ. At this rate of going I think it will be a long time before such a state of things comes to pass. "The churches are asleep. They have grown too respectable to help poor and needy people. One hears of this church being spoken of as the 'fashionable' church. Only well-to-do people are counted in the congregation. Ministers themselves see that none but the very best are admitted to the church. Many ministers nowadays are afraid to preach. They think if they did not preach on sensational subjects, their congregations would dwindle away. I would rather be the poorest preacher in Methodism and preach the gospel, than receive the fattest salary that is handed out and preach just to suit the people. "What is the remedy for this? you will ask. Get the minister and the people imbued with the Holy Spirit and the desired result will be brought about. We need another Pentecost. Then people would not be too tired to come out to church on Sunday morning, and they will look for something more than eloquence from the minister. "Another thing which is needed in the church to-day is spiritual dynamite. The cannon, the ball and the powder when separated are harmless, but when touched with a match instantly become a mighty force. The church, the minister and young people's societies will all be fruitless unless touched with the power of the Holy Ghost. The minister needs dynamite and the power of the Holy Ghost to enable him to do his work properly. "In conclusion Mr. Robinson said that Christians nowadays are tongue-tied. They need a surgical operation. One might be in the company of a Christian nowadays for a week or a month and not hear them speak a word about the Master. "The special music for the occasion was very acceptable. The choir rendered the anthem, "King of Kings," with enthusiasm. William Mack's solo was well rendered and the quartette setting of "Abide With Me" as rendered by Messrs. Mitchell and Sherbro and Messrs. Mack and Williams, made a fitting close of the service. "Flower Sunday was observed in the morning, having been delayed a week until the new minister should arrive. The main body of the church was fittingly decorated with flowers picked on Saturday by members of the school. Miss Emma Wilder, superintendent, presided. The church was filled to the doors and the simple service was very beautiful. A number of children from the Orphan's Home, in charge of Mr. Smeaton, were present and occupied a portion of the edifice. Choruses, recitations and short addresses by members of the school and the pastor constituted the programme which was brought to a close shortly after twelve o'clock.

WOULD NOT TRUST.

And as a Result Considerable Litigation Followed.

A little faith on the part of either party would have avoided the litigation between Alfred D. Snider and Lilian May Snider, of the united Counties of Lennox and Addington, according to the decision of Justice Britton. A. D. Snider entered into an agreement with Mrs. L. M. Snider to purchase a seventy-five-acre farm on April 1st, 1911, but when the time for fulfilment of the contract came around the plaintiff would not give over the money until he entered into full possession of the land and the defendant would not surrender the farm until she received the money. In the evidence Mr. Snider said he had been told that he was dealing with a really class of people, and the defendant said she had been warned that he was a person with whom she would have to be careful in dealing. His lordship decides that the money was not in the possession of the plaintiff when he demanded the property, and the deed was in the defendant's hands ready to be given in exchange for the money at any time, so the action is dismissed without costs.

WOLFE ISLAND WOES

HAVING TROUBLE IN REGARD TO ITS FERRY.

The People Impatient Over the Delay in Completing Their Boat—Difficulty in Getting a Supply Boat.

The Wolfe Island council is having its troubles over its ferry. Early in May it put its steamer Wolfe Islander on the Davis dry dock to have false sides added so as to give the steamer larger carrying capacity and more stability. The work has taken longer than expected, six weeks having been figured upon, although there was no set time in the contract, and because of this the island council is being criticized by many of the people. The steamer Pierpont was engaged to do the island ferry work for six weeks, at the end of which time it was expected that the Wolfe Islander would be completed. The Thousand Island steamboat company, which had the island council in mind to buy a few days ago, leasing the steamer for twenty dollars a day, the council to supply the crew and fuel. It was essential for the Pierpont to go on the Cape Vincent route, and to be first painted, so that boat had to be taken off. However, the company fitted out the steamer Jessie Blain to fill the gap. The latter boat was insufficient, and after two days it was taken off the route.

The climax was reached on Saturday when the council arranged to have the islanders carried to and from the city on Grant Pike's snow, towed by a gasoline yacht. The customs refused to allow this, and the improvised service had to be abandoned, although a fee was not charged the passengers. Motor boats which carried islanders were also ordered to cease engaging in the traffic, as they are not allowed to go into the passenger carrying trade without inspection and a license. Things were hot at the city wharf of the islanders for a time, and the law was sought. The steamer Mississquoi relieved the situation by making a couple of trips to and from the island before three o'clock. The La Monde did duty on Sunday and Monday.

It is expected that the Wolfe Islander will be able to resume her trip, today. She came out of the David dry-dock, Tuesday morning, and sealed up at Swift's wharf. The steamer La Monde is running until the Wolfe Islander is prepared to get back to her old trip.
