J. C. McConachie Speaks of His Work for the Children's Aid Society—Secondary Causes are Laziness and Bad Tempter.

It was expected there would be a meeting of the Children's Aid Society on Wednesday afternoon, but it was not held.

In conversation with the agent, J. C. McConachie, the Whig learned that the work is being vigorously pushed along in this district.

During the month, fourteen children were before the police magistrate, in juvenile court. Six were made wards of the society on probation.

There were many cases, remarked the agent when questioned, "but the primary, ever-present cause is whiskey. The secondary causes are laziness and bad temper. Whiskey, however, is the great root of evil homes."

Mr. McConachie again strongly pointed out the great need for a shelter in the city, to carry on the work.
