SHORT TERMS IN JAIL

GIVEN DECK HANDS WHO CREATED DISTURBANCE

On the Steamer Kingston the Other Night—Ringleaders Were Given Four Weeks and the Others Given Two Weeks Each—Sad Story of Strong Drink Revealed.

At the police court, Friday morning, Magistrate Farrell imposed sentence on the three young men who were arrested for creating the disturbance on the steamer Kingston, Monday night, and a fourth was allowed his liberty, the magistrate believing that he had been led into the trouble and that the time he had already spent in jail would be sufficient punishment for him.

William Sparring was given his liberty, as the magistrate said that it was his opinion that he had been led into the trouble. He considered that the accused had sufficient already in the days spent in the jail on remand.

John McKee, well up in years, and Mrs. Elizabeth Keenan, much younger, were arrested, last night, for drunkenness, by Constables Naylon and McAdoo.

The constables found half a flask of whiskey in the baby carriage and stated that both Mrs. Keenan and McKee were very drunk, but both denied the charge very strongly and claimed the court was not giving them a "square deal," as they termed it.

Mrs. Keenan is a member of the "prohibited list" and was questioned by the court as to where she had secured her liquor. She claimed that a woman who came over from Rochester gave her the liquor but the magistrate put "no faith" in her story and sentenced her to three months in jail.

"If you can, in the meantime recall where you secured the liquor," remarked the court. "I may reconsider your case."

Mrs. Keenan was very angry over the decision of the magistrate and stated that she would appeal the decision. The court imposed a penalty of \$3 and costs on McKee. He, too, was dissatisfied with the decision of the magistrate, and said he would appeal.
