GREAT CROP AT REGINA

G. H. HINCH WRITES ABOUT AN AUTOMOBILE TRIP

Through Miles of Continuous Crop—The Outlook Could Not Be More Promising Than at Present.

Lumsden, Sask., July 1.—While in Regina this week, I made a sixty-mile trip by auto through the Regina district and the week before through the Yellow Grass and Weyburn districts. I tip of some ninety miles. From Regina we went south to Mooney and then out through the Conche, Trarvare and Lumsden districts and returned by way of the Cottonwood district to Regina. The run is almost through continuous crop and it is a wonderful sight, the gently undulating fields of most vivid green stretching mile after mile. The crop is well rooted and of excellent color, and though not so deeply rooted as could be desired, shows a decidedly better root than any district I have been in except possibly Yellow Grass on the Soo line of the C.P.R.

To the north and northwest, where the land is much heavier the growth has been slower and while some fields were seen that were coming into the show blade there are very many that will not be shot for fully two weeks, and a few that will be even longer. The flax fields are with a few exceptions, showing a fine stand, but are generally not so far advanced as those on the Soo line. While there is much highly cultivated land north and northwest of Regina, there are many farms where stink weed and mustard are retarding the growth of wheat, and owing to rains, farmers are late with their fallows and these are very weedy.

Through the Lumsden and Cottonwood district the land is somewhat lighter. The growth has been more rapid, and many fields were seen that would go twenty-four inches and over and much of this is just coming into the show blade. This is undoubtedly one of the best formed districts in Saskatchewan.

Rotation of crops and seeding to grass have been practised ever since the coming of the Mutch Bros., the first homesteaders northwest of Regina.

ARE CARS NECESSARY

IN KINGSTON IS THE QUESTION BEING DECIDED.

By the Lord's Day Alliance of Canada—Secretary Rochester, of Toronto, Has the Matter Before Him.

Toronto, July 7.—Are Sunday cars a necessity in Kingston? On this query hinges the action to be taken by the Lord's Day Alliance of Canada. Rev. W. M. Rochester, M.A., secretary of the alliance, stated, this morning, that as yet he had not taken up the matter, "but," he added, "it is to come under my consideration to-day, and I am collecting all information I can, as is customary in all such cases, as we never oppose or condone anything until we have gone fully into its merits and demerits. When I have done this I will make my decision known."

Statement by H. C. Nickle.
When interviewed to-day by the Whig in regard to the attitude taken by the people of the city in regard to the Sunday street car question, Hugh C. Nickle, superintendent of the road, said that most of the ministers were willing that the cars should be run if the employees would have the privilege of attending service at least once a Sunday. Mr. Nickle said this difficulty could easily be overcome as only half the staff would work on Sunday so that twelve men would work and the other half would be free. As the service will not start until one o'clock, the men who work will have the opportunity of attending service in the morning. He said, "it would not hurt the Sunday schools, as most of them closed down for the summer and the remainder meet in the morning before church."

"I heard this morning," he said, "that the Trades and Labor Council is unanimous in its decision in favor of Sunday cars, and its opinion is the one we wish."

Rev. Dr. Jordan thinks the constitutionality of running street cars should be established first. If the company's charter gives it the right well and good, but this must be established by the courts. In London, Ont., the people cannot have a chance to vote whether they shall have Sunday cars, as the Ontario government only allows decisions in places over 50,000 population. Personally the doctor did not favor Sunday cars—there being plenty of parks and breathing places in the city—but the public had the determining voice and it should be heard.

George Mills said: "As to the possible cause of blowing of Sunday street cars, there is undoubtedly room for honest differences of opinion. However, the cars do run, it does seem to me, that the ministers and church workers should take advantage of Mr. Richardson's offer to reserve the pavilion in Lake Ontario Park for religious meetings. To catch fish you must go where the fish are, and acting on this principle, the great evangelist, B. L. Moody, always looked up those only door gatherings of the people as special opportunities for telling out. The Old, Old Story in sermon and song. Why not make a trial of this in both Macdonald and Lake Ontario Parks?"

J. B. Walkem expressed himself as being in favor of the proposed scheme. It was no worse he said than going down the river or for a drive. "The rivers," he said, "are in full swing on Sunday's, yet no one kicks about it. I think it is alright."

LAD BECAME HOMESICK.
Ran Away From Home, But Gave Himself Up.
Becoming homesick after being in Kingston a couple of weeks, having ran away from his home in Windsor, Ont., Wallace Taron, aged thirteen years, gave himself up to the police and J. S. McDonachie, agent for the Children's Aid society. Mr. McDonachie took this matter up with Mayor Graham, and the latter consented to give the youngster a railway pass to his home.

The lad formerly lived in this city and when he ran away from home came direct to Kingston. He had been working for a time but got homesick that he could not stand it any longer and had to give in. He went west this afternoon.

WON CIRCUIT RACE.
Ensign Conneau Covered 950 Miles in Twenty-three Hours.
Paris, July 7.—Ensign Conneau, winner of the Paris-to-Rome race, won the international circuit race, to-day, flying from Calais to Vincennes, 156 miles, in three hours and twenty-five minutes. The distance covered was 950 miles, and his actual flying time was a little over twenty-three hours. It is remarkable that in a race through all sorts of atmospheric conditions he met no serious accidents.

CHICAGO WOMAN WORRIED
Over Soo Murderess, and Will Write Sir A. B. Aylesworth.
Chicago, July 7.—Some of the most prominent women in the city have taken up the case of Angelina Rapollano, the condemned murderess at the Soo, and have issued an appeal to all women in Chicago to write the Canadian minister of justice to ask him to give the woman a month's respite after the birth of her child.

AN EPIDEMIC OF CHOLERA.
Reported at Italian Seaports—Situation Serious.
Vienna, Austria, July 7.—Papers here report the epidemic of cholera at Italian seaports. Correspondents say they have been warned by the Italian government that if they send despatches of the existence of the disease they will be expelled from Italy. Travellers arriving here say the situation is very serious.

TWO PICNIC ACCIDENTS.
Girls Were in Danger, Row Boat Drifted Away.
Two accidents occurred at two different Sunday school picnics, Thursday afternoon, which cast a gloom over both, and one of them was nearly fatal. Three young ladies were in bathing at the wharf at Staley's Grove, where Bethel Sunday school was holding its picnic, when they got in a current which swept them off their feet and out into deep water. One of the girls was a good swimmer but she was dragged under the surface by her two companions, who became excited. Two gentlemen on the wharf jumped in with their clothes on and assisted the girls to get out. One girl was "badly used up over the struggle, and took her some time to recover herself, but to-day she was feeling none the worse for her experience."

The other accident happened at St. John's picnic, which was held at Brophy's Point. A young man, from Portsmouth, with three girls, went out for a row in a skiff. When they got out in the middle of the stream one of their oar-locks broke, and the boat commenced to drift down stream. In a short time the boat with its occupants was out of sight and a row boat was sent to look the wanderers up. Time went on and this boat did not return, so a motor boat was sent out after the two. They couldn't find the first boat but towed the second boat behind them.

The disabled boat drifted down the river and was sighted by the Caspian on her way to Kingston. A short time after she passed them the Caspian met the Lamonde and called to Capt. Hammond to be on the lookout for the boat. A short time after they were picked up by the boat and all taken down to Clayton. They returned to the city earlier in the evening than those who were at the picnic, none the worse for the experience.

FRANCE CANNOT CONSENT
To Germany's Permanent Occupation of Agadir.
Paris, July 7.—M. Cambon, French ambassador to Berlin, is returning there, to-day, with instructions to inform the German government that France cannot consent to the permanent occupation of Agadir, and to ask an explanation for Germany's action.

St. Petersburg, July 7.—There is strong feeling here against Austria for backing up Montenegro in that country's attitude towards Turkey. It is felt if Turkey does not quiet the Albanians war will soon be declared by Montenegro.

London, July 7.—At Liverpool two men were sent to trial, charged with robbing Robert Lennox Clark, a real estate agent from Vancouver, of two thousand dollars' worth of luggage on landing there.
