SEEKS FATHER'S BODY

BURIED BENEATH GLACIER FOR FORTY YEARS.

Once More a Quincy, Mass. Woman Sets Out to Watch Bessons' Mouth—Will the Glacier Yield Its Dead?

Quincy, Mass., July 7.—Hoping that the traditions of the Bessons glacier of Mount Blanc will hold true for ever and give up its dead after forty years Mrs. Edith C. Randall, whose father, John C. Randall, a banker, lost his life, with ten others, on September 2nd, 1870, will soon start for Chamoni, at the foot of the mountain, and take up her vigil in the expectation that the body will be disgorged. She has visited the icy tomb of the Quincy banker three times—twice just to gaze at his temporary burial spot, and last year on a similar errand to this, which proved fruitless.

Alpenstocks and other articles belonging to the party recently have been discovered at the ice of the glacier melted and ran to the sea, and for this reason Miss Randall hopes that at last she may recover the body.

Mr. Randall, Dr. James B. Bean, of Jonesborough, Tenn., and the Rev. George M. Corkindale, of Scotland, with eight trained guides, were the ones to be swept to their death on the summit of Mount Blanc in 1870. Mr. Randall had for many years been planning an ascent of the mountain that has taken a toll of half a thousand climbers, and he left his home in May, 1870.

Mount Blanc is 15,782 feet high. At the ten thousand foot point is a shelter house where the climbers spend the night and make an early dash the next morning for the summit. Then they are enabled to return to the shelter the same day.

The Randall party reached the top, as was recorded in Mr. Bean's diary, but on the return trip they were overtaken by a terrible storm. The party was seen from Chamoni proceeding slowly, but finally the snow became so thick that they were hidden from view. The top of the mount was not

visible again for eight days. Five of the party—Dr. Bean and the Rev. Mr. Corkindale, with three guides—were found, but friends and relatives of the other eight are still anxiously awaiting further proof of the tradition that the glacier always yields its dead. It never has failed heretofore.

WILD CATTERS ARE AT WORK.

Grand Trunk Pacific Takes Legal Action Against Private Companies Using Its Name.

Winnipeg, July 6.—The Grand Trunk Pacific has issued formal warning against real estate men who are offering in the name of the railway company to sell lots in bogus townships along its lines in the western provinces and has given notice that all such people will be prosecuted in the courts. D'Arcy Tate, solicitor for the company, states that actions are now pending in the courts against six or seven concerns that are using the company's name, and that all wild-catters will be brought to justice in an endeavor to prevent the repetitions of such misrepresentations as have already occurred in a number of cases.

This announcement is official, and states that the company itself has established all divisional points and stations, and that the sales will be made through its bona fide agents. The authorities cite as an example of fraudulent advertising the exploitation of the townsite of Alice, on the Calgary-Edmonton line of the Grand Trunk Pacific.

This has been widely advertised as a divisional point and lots have sold at correspondingly high figures. As a matter of fact, the actual divisional point is at Mirvor, some six miles away from the townsite of Alice, and the railway company has no interest whatsoever in the townsite last named. Other instances are cited where the Grand Trunk Pacific name has been used to sell lots in townships miles away from any station, and without any authority whatsoever from the company. Action has been brought against the Grand Trunk Pacific Transfer Company, of Vancouver, to restrain that concern from future trading under the name of the big corporation, and will shortly be brought against the Grand Trunk Land company, which also is a private concern. Scores of real estate companies, employment agencies, hotels, livery stables, transfer companies and grocery establishments throughout the west make use of the name of the Grand Trunk Pacific, and it is President Hays' intention to put a stop to all unauthorized use of the name of the Grand Trunk Pacific by any private concern.

The use of the name by land companies is described as intended to mislead innocent purchasers, for the most part those who wish to buy lots for the increase in value following settlement of the surrounding country, and the rapid growth of the towns themselves. Where there is no station service there will be no town, and such sales therefore would be fraudulent and lead to loss. The public is notified that all such intending purchasers should communicate direct with the railway's agency, the Transcontinental Townsite Company, at Winnipeg and get the facts.

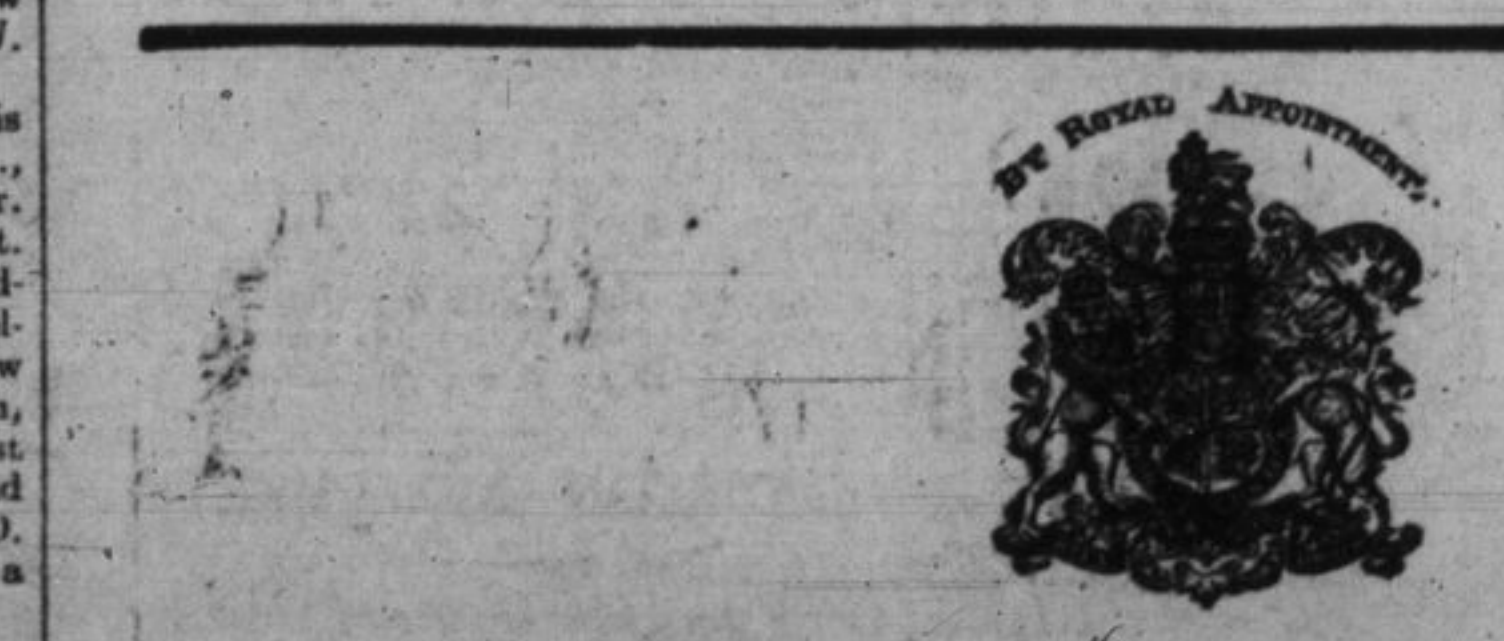
