**PAID WARM TRIBUTE THE CHURCH SERVICES**

TO RETIRING MEMBER OF THE TEACHING STAFF.

Board of Education Made Presentation of \$100 to Miss Minnie Davis—On Staff for Many Years.

The board of education, at its session on Friday night, paid a warm tribute to Miss Minnie Davis, who recently resigned from the teaching staff, after serving many years, her work being of the very best, and tending to mould, in the right direction, the many hundreds of pupils who came under her charge, during the long service she rendered for such a worthy and notable cause.

In addition to paying the tribute to her worth, the board also presented Miss Davis with the sum of \$100, as a parting remembrance of the valuable service she has rendered. Members of the board spoke of her work.

Trustee Meek referred to the work of Miss Davis, and introduced the resolution granting the amount mentioned, which was carried by a standing vote. Trustee Meek referred to Miss Davis as one of the best teachers the board ever had on the staff, one who was ever painstaking, one who had the esteem of all her pupils, and who had, by her careful attention to duty accomplished much good.

Trustee Lambert referred to Miss Davis as one of the city's best assets. She was a good teacher, and it was a matter of great regret that she was leaving the service.

Trustee Elliott added a few words. Miss Davis he pointed out, was a teacher who had put her heart and soul into the work, and had left a valuable impression on her pupils. He regretted very much that the board would be deprived of her services.

Trustee Bennett also made a few appropriate remarks, in which he referred to the good work accomplished by Miss Davis during her long term of service. Good service of this kind should be recognized. He was very sorry to hear that Miss Davis was obliged to give up her work.

Inspector Stuart also paid a warm tribute to the work of Miss Davis, referring especially to the way in which she carried out her work in the class, always having the scholars under her control. It was always a great pleasure, for him to visit her room and see the way in which the work was carried out.

Just a few of the members spoke, but each member heartily endorsed all that had been said about Miss Davis, who is now about to retire from school service.

Hemens, of Massena, N.Y., came up, yesterday afternoon, with an excursion party.

Cowboys come from all parts of the west to contest with each other in riding outlaw horses, roping steers, and other hazardous pastimes familiar to the great plains. A horse known as "Old Steamboat" has been the star performer at Cheyenne among the outlaw riders for the past five years. "Old Steamboat" succeeded in throwing all comers until Buffalo Vernon tried to stay on the back of the famous outlaw, but he required the attention of several stearns after his experience with "Old Steamboat." Buffalo Vernon is the star bronco buster with the Young Buffalo Wild West show, which will exhibit in this city Tuesday afternoon and night, July 11th.

E. C. Davis, the Ex-Queen's Student to Stand Trial.
