## WILL COMMENCE WORK

ON THE ERECTION OF THE NEW SCHOOL.

Contracts Awarded at Special Meeting of Board Friday Night—Total Cost of Work Estimated at \$39,476.

Work on the new school can now be commenced as soon as the contractors are ready to start. The Board of Education, at a special meeting, Friday night, awarded the contracts for the property committee. The report of the committee was received and adopted, after one amendment was made to it. . . . .

Mason work, H. Watts, \$14,000; heating, plumbing, tin-smithing, Simmons Bros., \$6,234; painting and glazing, W. H. Savage, \$763; carpentering, King & Grant, \$11,460.

The site for the school cost \$4,250; fences, \$200; hardware, \$450; weather strips, \$216; architect's fees, \$1,500, making the total cost, \$39,476.

### Call for New Tenders.

Trustee Elliott moved, seconded by Trustee Henderson, that the property committee be authorized to call for new tenders for the work required.

Following out his resolution, Trustee Elliott stated that so many changes had been made, he felt satisfied that should new tenders be called for, that reduced prices would be the result. . . . .

Trustee Henderson, in view of the many alterations, regarded the matter as a new proposition entirely, and thought that new tenders should be called for. . . . .

Trustee Meek wanted to know how long it would take to call for new tenders, and the architect stated it would require about three weeks' time.

Trustee Anglin considered it would be unwise to call for new tenders. . . . .

The resolution of Trustee Elliott to call for new tenders was finally voted on and defeated by a vote of 10 to 2 as follows.

Yeas—Trustees Elliott and Henderson—2.

Nays—Trustees Anglin, Bennett, Craig, Lambert, Lockett, Macneae, Meek, Metcalfe, McLean, Wallace—10.

The property committee's report showed that the amount for fire escapes (\$544) had been omitted, and this caused Trustee Henderson to ask a few questions. . . . .

Trustee Wallace made quite a lengthy speech in which he claimed that the property committee had not been well treated by some of the members of the board. . . . .

Trustee Lockett said he was keenly disappointed to find that the property committee had to cut down the cost of the school. . . . .

Although, no doubt, the teaching might be carried on just as well in a cheaper school, still he felt that the city should have a better school. . . . .

Trustee Meek said he was pleased to know that the committee from the board had not pressed the council for \$5,000. . . . .

school not being finished off it was a good thing not to have it finished, so the pupils could write on the walls. The expense should be cut down to meet the money in hand. . . . .

Trustee Elliott pointed out that he was not opposed to the expenditure of large sums on schools. . . . .

The report of the property committee, with the one amendment accepting the tender of Simmons Bros., was then accepted.

On motion of Trustee Macneae and McLean, the board adjourned until called by the chair, which means that there will be no more meetings during July and August.

On motion of Trustee Craig, an order was carried for the passing of all accounts, after same had been signed by the chairman of committees and audited.

In connection with the cut made in the original estimates it might be stated that in the mason work there was a cut of \$2,377; carpentering, \$430; plumbing, etc., \$185.

Trustee Henderson asked if anything was being done in the way of repairs to Louise and Catarqui schools, but was informed by Trustee Macneae that as yet no action had been taken.
