Forest Fires in Canada.
Toronto World.
Bulletin No. 9 of the forestry branch of the Dominion Department contains a general review of the situation. The actual waste is hard to ascertain, but if the stumpage value is placed at the low sum of fifty cents per thousand feet the smallest royalty collected by any Canadian government, the loss to the public treasury has been \$1,042,000,000. This means that for every foot of timber that has ever been cut in Canada at least seven feet have been destroyed by fire. In the Ottawa Valley it is believed that fully one-half have been burned for every one cut by the lumbermen.
Notwithstanding the efforts made to check timber destruction by fire the authors estimate what is annually lost in this way is probably as much as is annually cut for use. The authors hold that forest fires are largely preventable and their occurrence is due not so much to lack of laws as lack of enforcement of existing laws. Canada, of all the civilized nations in the northern hemisphere is doing the least to treat the public lands as a permanent asset.
