### DAVIS WAS REMANDED

#### QUEEN'S STUDENT ARRAIGNED IN POLICE COURT

On Charge Stealing Microscope From Medical Faculty—Asked to Have Time to Consult Lawyer, and the Magistrate Consented.

Constable James Craig arrived in the city on Friday morning, at eight o'clock, with E. C. Davis, accused of theft, after making a trip of 2,000 miles, for his prisoner.

Davis was placed under arrest, at Prince Albert, Sask., accused of the theft of a microscope from Queen's medical faculty. When asked to plead to the charge, he said he wished to consult a lawyer, and the magistrate put the case over until Tuesday.

The charge against Davis, as read out by the magistrate, was that he did steal, take, or carry away a microscope from the college, on or about March 25th. Davis was a student at the college, and it will be remembered that his arrest was brought about by Dr. W. Connell, who, while in Toronto, came across a microscope in a Toronto establishment, which he identified as belonging to the college.

Davis is a student of dark complexion, when he was asked what he had to say in answer to the charge he did not plead, but asked if he could get a lawyer.

"Yes, you can get any person you like," remarked the magistrate, as he put the case over until Tuesday.

Constable Craig left here eight days ago, and made the long jaunt in good time. The police at Prince Albert had Davis under arrest and waiting for him, in the police station.

J. McD. Mowat will appear on behalf of Davis, the Queen's student, when the case is called in police court Tuesday morning. Mr. Mowat had an interview with the accused, after the session of the court.

John McIntyre, registered as a drunk, pleaded guilty and was fined \$1 and costs. He claims New York as his home, and stated that he had been on the "water-wagon" for six months. He slipped off the wagon just as soon as he struck Kingston, on Friday last.

William Smilie was accused of being drunk, but a charge of vagrancy was also added. It was his first appearance, as he explained, and asked for a chance. He said he could get a job, helping to gather in the hay at Wolfe Island. However, the magistrate did not think it was worth he was looking for, and so gave him just one hour to get out of the city.

Smilie said the hour would be ample time for him to shake the dust of Kingston off his feet, and after bidding farewell to the court and officials, he cleared for other regions.

"If you are arrested here again," said the magistrate to Smilie, "you will be sent up for some time."

### CONCERT IN MACDONALD PARK.

### UNITED STATES VESSELS FAILED TO REPORT REPAIRS TO CUSTOMS—SCHOONER JAMIESON STRUCK BY SQUALL.

The steamer Caspian is hard on, where she struck at Point Ann, near Belleville. The tug Parthia which went to the assistance of the disabled steamer will not be able to pull her off alone. It will require the assistance of two tugs and another will be sent up to-day. The water was drawn off her boilers to lighten her as much as possible, and a large part of the cargo will be removed.

### Movements of Vessels.

She had a large number of passengers aboard; another large number of the steamer Kingston this morning; the steamer Kingston and Aletha, down and up to-day; steamer Britannic due to pass up to-day; the schooner Bertie Calkins is expected in from Oswego to-day with coal.

M.T. Co.'s elevator: The tug Emerson cleared with two light barges for Charlotte, to load coal, will return with two barges, from North Fairhaven, steamer Gordon arrived at noon from Fort William and discharged 72,000 bushels of wheat; the tug Bartlett is due to arrive Saturday with the barge Augusta, loaded with coal from Sandusky; the steamer Kimmount is due to arrive from Sydney, Saturday, on her way to Fort William with a cargo of rails, will take large Hamilton in tow to Fort William.

### Schooner Jamieson Suffered.

The schooner W. M. Jamieson, of Kingston, Captain John McCullough, master, had a narrow escape while about twelve miles off Oswego, on Wednesday. The vessel had all sails set but was making an effort to take them in before the high wind of an approaching storm should strike. All the sails were in except the mainsail, and these were half down, when the squall came upon them. The terrific wind split the mainsail and the smaller foresail from top to bottom and tore part of the mainsail to ribbons. Although the sails were badly damaged there was no real danger to the cap-

tain, according to Captain McCullough.

### Failed to Report Repairs.

A number of United States vessels that have been repaired this season at Kingston docks, have failed to report the cost of the repairs to the U. S. customs, and, as a result, are going to get into trouble. They should have notified the United States consul concerning the work done on them, and then their customs department would have assessed the duty to be paid on the repairs done in a foreign country. Now, the matter has been reported to Washington and fines may be levied on the owners for failing to comply with the customs law.

### Site for Public Library.

Several leading citizens are of the opinion that if a Carnegie library is secured for Kingston, the building should be erected in Clarence Street Park, as a most central downtown site. The idea of establishing it at Queen's University does not meet with general approval.
